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WORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS FOR ONE NATIONAL SCHOOL

Will West York County Orange Lodge Lead Its Strength—A Strong Resolution.

Weston, March 12.—A largely attended special meeting of the West York County Orange Lodge was held in Dufferin Hall this afternoon. County Master Andrew Irvine of Toronto Junction, presiding. After transacting unfinished business, left over from the previous meeting, the following resolution, moved by Bro. Agnew and J. T. Hall, was submitted and carried unanimously: "We, the members of the Loyal Orange County Lodge of the County of West York, protest against the contemplated legislation of the present government of Canada with regard to forcing separate schools upon the new provinces about to be created in the great west, in the interest of the Roman Catholic Church, or any other religious denomination, and would request all true and loyal Canadians to urge upon their representatives in the house of commons the importance of opposing such legislation."

"And we pledge ourselves to do our utmost to defeat any member of the house of commons who will support the present legislation, or any other legislation of a similar nature, either now or at any future time."

"And be it further resolved that no tentative clauses should be accepted in lieu of or as a compromise for the educational clauses now appearing in the autonomy bill, but that the entire control of educational matters should be left to the legislatures of the new provinces."

"And be it further resolved that we are in favor of one national school and one national language with equal rights to all and special privileges to none, and we pledge ourselves to use every legitimate means to bring this about in every province of the Dominion."

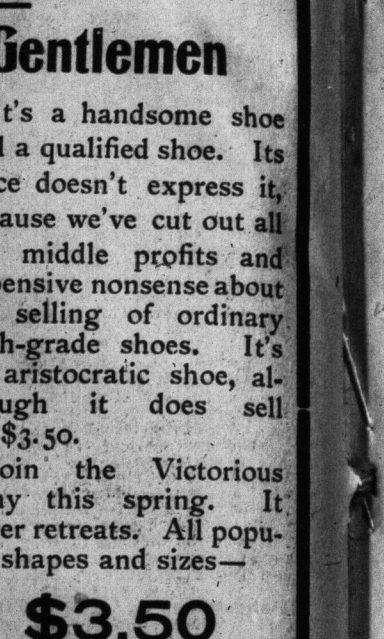

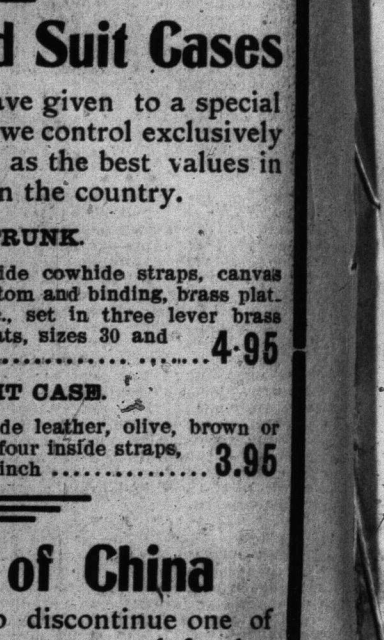

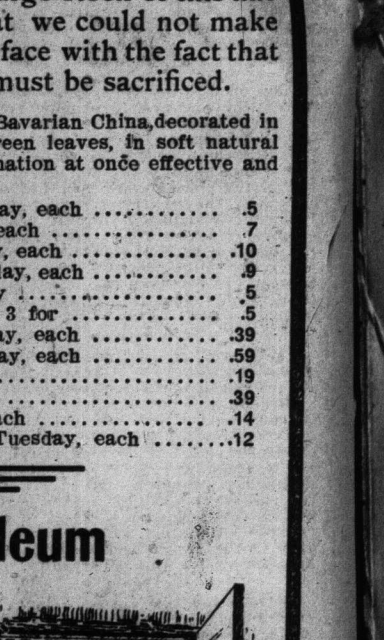
