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WAIT-SURGICAL SUPPLIES FOR RED CROSS WORK

More Pronounced Demand in View of Expected Fury of Fighting in Spring

Toronto, Feb. 23—When the Canadian soldiers have taken their places in the trenches and received their baptism of fire, when the Red Cross ambulances begin to gather up those who are wounded in the fight, this terrible war will come home with a greater reality to all Canadian people.

Until lately there has been no great demand for surgical supplies but the following cablegram, received recently from Colonel Hodgetts, Canadian commissaire for the Canadian Red Cross Society at headquarters in this city, will show that surgical supplies of all kinds are now needed badly.

A new leaflet, dealing with the making of surgical supplies, has just been printed and can be obtained on application to Mrs. Plumtree, Supt. of Supplies, 77 King Street, East, Toronto, who will have the order filled and sent C. O. D. with the order.

Doctors and nurses who are supervising the work will know how to vary the articles and also what additional ones might be made. It is safe to say that the necessary dressing or supply which will stand packing and transportation will be of use in Red Cross work.
