## SUPPER BILL OF FAKIR LARGE ONE

Kicked Out of Restaurant in  
Paris When He Objects to  
Payment

PARIS, Aug. 19.—The fakir, Tahra Bay, who recently started London, is now back in Paris, and is giving a series of performances at the Comedie des Champs Elysees. The theatre is not the only place, however, at which he is making a public appearance. Owing to a restaurant scene which took place in the small hours, one morning last February, he is also to appear in the public Police Court.  
The fakir was presented with a supper bill of 479 francs. He refused objections, and in addition, refused to

tip the waiter. He is now suing two of these who thrust him somewhat violently into the street for 220 francs damages. The proprietor of the restaurant is putting in a counter-claim for 10,000 francs for broken crockery. The management of the restaurant complain that since the fakir is insensible to pain he ought not to object to the blows he received, to which the fakir replies that he is only insensible when in a state of catalepsy, and one can hardly be cataleptic when one has supped for 479 francs.

## MEDAL PRESENTED TO BRAVE GIRL

Tended Lighthouse When Parents  
Unable to Return Owing  
to Seas

LONDON, Aug. 19.—For her courage in maintaining single-handed, the lamp of the Bembridge, Isle of Wight lighthouse, a 15-year-old girl is to receive Lloyd's bronze medal for meritorious services.  
Miss Ethel Langton, the daughter of the keeper of St. Helen's Fort lighthouse, was left on the lighthouse on March 20 while her parents made a dash for shore to replenish provisions. They could not get back, owing to a

severe gale, and for three days and nights the girl was alone, with only her pet dog for company.  
Undaunted, she kept the flashing light burning, climbing 20ft. up a steel ladder at regular intervals to attend to the oil-burning lamp. All the food the girl had was half a loaf of bread. She was quite well and cheerful, when her parents eventually reached the lighthouse.  
The bronze medal, says "Lloyd's List," has not previously been awarded to a woman, but the silver medal was conferred upon the wife of a ship's captain in 1897. With very few exceptions, the recipients of the medal have been members of the mercantile marine.

### NEW ETHYL SOURCE

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 19.—(United Press).—Germany leads the world in the production of ethyl gasoline, but California sea water may become the foremost source of this fuel, which is

derived mainly from bromine of ocean water.  
The governmental experimental steamer Ethyl, now working off the California coast to determine if bromine can be extracted to determine if bromine can be extracted in paying quantities, has been producing approximately 100,000 pounds a month, according to officials in charge of the work. They claim the California sea water, especially off the southern coast, carries a high content of the liquid element.
