MILK "BOOTLEGGING" TARGET TO BE PROBED

Meighen Scheduled To Deliver Keynote Speech At Ottawa July 21

Tiny Norwegian Craft Is Successful In Following Vikings' Track Over Ocean

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 13.—Following the track of the Vikings down which the Leif Erikson sailed 1,000 years ago to bring the Norsemen, who were the first white settlers of North America, a modern 10-ton craft, a second "Leif Erikson," sailed by Captain Gerhard Folger, of Norway, arrived here yesterday and will continue to Philadelphia. Captain Folger is duplicating the feat of his countryman 10 centuries ago, and is accompanied by three men and a dog. A few years ago William Washburn Nutting of New York City, accompanied by a few friends, made a similar attempt, but no word has been received from them since they left Greenland, and the successful voyagers who arrived here yesterday could throw no light on the fate of the Nutting party.

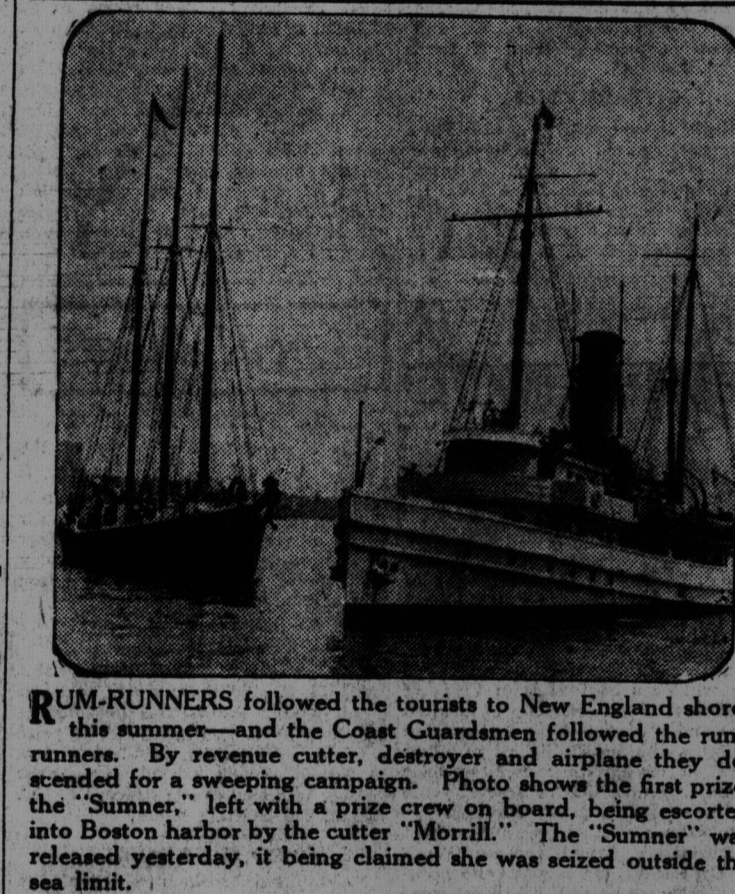
CHURCHILL GIVES TERMS OF DEBT SETTLEMENT

LONDON, July 13.—The settlement signed in London yesterday by Finance Minister Caillaux covers not only the French war debt but virtually all the outstanding accounts between Great Britain and France. Announcement to this effect was made in the House of Commons today by Right Hon. Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer. The French payments, he said, would be \$4,000,000, \$6,000,000, \$8,000,000 and \$10,000,000 rising to \$12,500,000 annually, the last named figure being reached in 1930. From 1930 to 1936 the payment would be \$12,500,000 annually, rising to \$14,000,000 for the final 31 years.

Polar Seas International In Character

OSLO, July 13.—Captain Amundsen and the Norwegian members of his expedition which successfully floated over the north pole in the dirigible Norge arrived at Bergen yesterday. Huge crowds turned out in the streets to welcome him. The voyage and various public bodies gathered at a banquet in honor of the explorer. Captain Amundsen told interviewers that, as no land had been seen around the pole, the Polar Basin should be considered only as equivalent to international waters and that no man could claim or annex the pole.

ELECTION DATE LIKELY HELD UP UNTIL ADDRESS

Cabinet Announcement May Be Made Tonight, is Report

QUEBEC MEETING

Indignation Liberal Gathering in Montreal Protests Byng's Action

OTTAWA, Ont., July 13.—Premier Meighen's mass meeting in Ottawa, called for next Friday, has been postponed until Wednesday, July 21. Officials of the local Conservative Association announced this today.

It is presumed that the Premier has asked for more time in which to prepare for the meeting. With negotiations for the new Cabinet still going on, Mr. Meighen has had little time to prepare his message to the electors.

TORONTO, July 13.—Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King will make his first speech in the Liberal campaign in Ontario at a picnic here on July 24, the meeting having been postponed three days from July 21. It will be staged on the outskirts of Toronto but definite announcement has not yet been made as to the place.

OTTAWA, July 13.—It is possible that the announcement of the date of the election may not be made until Friday night, when Premier Meighen will make what is expected to be his keynote speech at a mass meeting here. The announcement is expected before that, however. The formalities preceding an election require the lapse of between fifty and sixty days after the issue of the writs. This means that polling day probably will not be set for much earlier than September 15. The chief electoral officer, Col. O. M. Biggar, has asked for at least sixty days notice.

There is little prospect of a Cabinet announcement before this evening. It may go over another day.

A number of prominent men from the Province of Quebec are in Ottawa and it is understood that the question of Quebec representation in the Cabinet, one more representative of French speaking Canada also may be sworn in, with or without a portfolio. There are many rumors as to

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MacDONALD TERMS SESSIONS EXACTING

HALIFAX, N. S., July 13.—Hon. E. M. MacDonald, ex-Minister of National Defence, arrived in Halifax tonight and gave out a lengthy statement in regard to recent events at Ottawa. He stated that he had never experienced a more exacting session, and that the demands made on the energies of all the members had been great. The statement read in part: "The last two weeks were specially exciting, having seen the resignation of the King Government on the refusal of His Excellency to grant a dissolution and the defeat, three days afterwards, of the Rump Government which had illegally attempted to function during that period."

ROME, July 13.—Arnaldo Mussolini, brother of the Premier, has challenged General Benigno to a duel. The challenge follows critical comments by the General, who is a well known leader of the opposition to the Fascist Government, on an article written by the Premier's brother.

Gold Strike Reported In British Columbia

POWELL RIVER, B. C., July 13.—Reports reaching here from Van Anada, Texas Island, indicate that a gold strike of remarkable richness has been made on the property of the British Columbia Gold Mines, known locally as the "old nut cracker."

New Theory For Raspustin's Immunity From Poisoning

PARIS, July 13.—One of the secrets of the mysterious monk, Raspustin, which seemed to raise him above other men, and which enabled him to control the mind and destiny of the late Czar of Russia, was believed to have been revealed today when Professor Ville communicated to the Academy of Sciences the results of his latest experiments on animals.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Two investigating boards will be named by Secretary of the Navy Wilbur to inquire into various phases of the Lake Denmark naval arsenal explosions. One will seek to ascertain the cause and the damage to government property while the other will assess private property losses.

Charge Is Changed

Harold Lockhart Fined \$50 For Taking Barry Wilson's Automobile

RIVERA'S VISIT STIRS SOCIALISTS

LABOR CLASSES CALLED ON TO PUBLICLY EXPRESS DISAPPROVAL OF DICTATOR

PARIS, July 13.—The Socialist Federation of the Seine Department, in Congress yesterday, unanimously voted disapproval of the official reception by France of Premier Primo De Rivera and Muni Youssef, Sultan of Morocco.

GRAETON ON ARRIVAL

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REBELS REPULSED IN NORTH AFRICA

ROME, July 13.—More than 110 rebels have been killed in two successive engagements with Italian troops in Cyrenaica, Italian North Africa, an official statement announces. The Italian mobile column operating on the central plateau in Cyrenaica routed the rebel infiltration near Vadi Gerab, killing ten of them. Another large concentration numbering about 400 rebels was routed after four hours fighting. They lost more than 100 dead of which 76 fell into Italian hands. The Italian casualties were slight.

MR. TILLEY'S LETTER

In his letter to the Hon. Mr. Wigmore, acting as Chairman of the Board of Health during the illness of John Kelly, former Premier, Mr. Tilley, known to be a scientific dairyman, now back in commercial life claims that he has taken up the matter of the delivery of raw milk with members of the Board of Health on several occasions, registering a complaint which such milk was being irregularly sold, in other words "bootlegged." To quote Mr. Tilley's letter, he states:

KRIM IS EXILED ON REUNION ISLAND

PARIS, July 13.—Abd El Krim, the Rifian chief who surrendered to the French will be exiled to Reunion Island, in the Indian Ocean, under the terms of the Franco-Spanish-Moroccan accord signed here today. The island has a population of 172,000.

Moroccan Natives Wave White Flags to Bombers to Spare Lives

FEZ, Morocco, July 13.—While France and Spain have signed a so-called Moroccan "peace agreement" in Paris, native Rifians in this section find it necessary to wave white flags at French airplane bombers to make sure their lives will be spared.

Conservatives Using Films in Campaign

LONDON, July 13.—Holiday makers at the seaside resorts of England this summer are going to be disturbed by political propaganda films, some of which show Premier Baldwin at work in his office and in conversation with other ministers in the garden of his Downing street residence. The feature of the Conservative political campaign has been organized by the Junior Carlton Club, members of which are taking the film on tour.

DR. TAYLOR'S ATTITUDE

Mr. TILLEY further says that Minister of Health, Hon. Dr. Taylor claims that definite instructions have been given by the Government to prosecute any who are not living up to the new regulations and he would be surprised if local officials were not enforcing them. Mr. Tilley suggests the possibility of epidemics, if indiscriminate selling of raw milk is continued.
