WIRE-FENCE TELEPHONES

Cheap System Installed in U. S. West to Aid Farmers.

There are still many rural homes that do not have telephones, and, as at present, economy in all lines is imperative, interest is reviving in the "barbed wire system" which was more or less common in parts of the West twenty years ago.

In Carson County, S. D., the county agricultural agent has assisted farmers to install such a system at an average cost of material per farmer of less than \$20. Carson County is eighty-seven miles long and very sparsely settled, although the agricultural lands are fenced. Standard telephone lines appeared to be too expensive, yet there was a great need of facilitating communication. The county agent furnished information regarding the cost of installing the line, using porcelain nail knots for insulation, which cost about a mile. These knots worked satisfactorily when the barbed wire is tied to them with a short piece of wire. In order further to reduce the cost some farmers tied pieces of rubber cut from automobile inner tubes as insulators. Pieces of the tubing an inch and a half square were wound around the barbed wire and fastened to the post with staples. The county agent reports that this insulation is giving satisfaction, although, of course, the rubber will deteriorate in time.

The farmer was able to obtain second-hand telephones at from \$5 to \$20 each, and 50 cents bought a lightning arrester, so that the total cost to each farmer was nominal. Each farmer has his own special ring, so there is no expense for a central. It is possible with a system like this to connect various parts of the farm, or distant barns, with the house, or the tenant barns with the farm house at a very low cost. While such a system leaves much to be desired in the way of service, it means an emergency and can be made to answer, pending the coming of times when conditions will warrant a more expensive and more satisfactory system.

WARNS AUSTRALIA OF ARMAMENTS AS A CAUSE OF ECONOMIC STRESS

Melbourne, Oct. 3.—(Associated Press) Sir Joseph Cook, in introducing the budget in the Commonwealth House of Representatives, referred to the need for disarmament.

As she pulled the cord, Miss MacKie spoke the solemn words of the four men, who had died overseas: H. P. Rudolph MacKie, Henry Hager, Samuel Small and John H. Willis.
