### YEAR'S RECORD IN COMBATING RUM RUNNERS

Rouse's Point Officials Seized  
117 Autos, 18 Other Rigs  
and Some 2,000 Cases of  
Liquor.

Rouse's Point, N. Y., Jan. 4.—Seizure of 117 liquor laden automobiles, eighteen horses and rigs, in which intoxicants had been found, and confiscation of approximately 2,000 cases of liquor, comprising all kinds, marked the efforts of U. S. customs officers working out of this town, in their attempt to break up the illegal liquor traffic from Canada to this state during 1921. The automobiles seized comprised almost every make of car.

Fistful battles between bootleggers and officials occurred frequently during the year. It was said by the customs men. The officers are on duty night and day, and, according to their own stories, have "quite a little trouble," such as having their cars damaged by bootleggers running into them, and being shot at from a distance.

"Fortunately," said one official, "none of us has been seriously injured. Most if not all of the bootleggers carry automatic revolvers."

Another officer said some of the persons discovered with liquor in their possessions are "meek" and "give up when held up, without a struggle." It also was said that all sorts of schemes are employed by rum-runners in an attempt to bring liquor from Canada into this state on trains. Officials said that during the year they found and seized liquor secreted under mattresses, under seats, in linen closets and every conceivable place.

### WHISKEY DEARER

Ontario Dispensaries' Price to  
Go Up—Canadian Ales and  
Porters Reduced.

Toronto, Jan. 4.—An increase in the prices of Scotch and Irish whiskies at the Ontario Government dispensaries is announced effective on January 9. Today the prices of Canadian ales and porters were reduced. It is also probable that the prices of Canadian whiskies will be increased, as the dispensaries have advised that they will charge more to the dispensaries.

### POLICE COURT.

Yesterday in the police court Ernest Wilson pleaded not guilty to a charge of illegally having liquor in his possession. Inspector Henderson told of finding a bottle of liquor containing 11.2 per cent. of proof spirit by weight in the office of the accused at 111 Garmarthen street. He said he had warned the defendant that if he didn't open the shop they would get a search warrant and break into it. Inspector Killen corroborated this evidence. A postponement was granted the accused so he could examine carefully several sections of the act. W. M. Ryan appeared for the prosecution. In the afternoon session of the case against Ernest Northrup, charged with the theft of clothes from Murray Jarvis' office at 74 Prince William street, Detective Biddiscombe gave evidence. He told of searching the house of the accused and finding an overcoat and a blue suit, identified by Mr. Jarvis, and of the accused's brother bringing a black suit, also identified, to him at the station. The case was postponed until this morning for further evidence. W. M. Ryan appeared for the defence.

The case against George Banks, charged with assaulting Harry Holt, was allowed to drop when the men shook hands and agreed to be friends. G. H. V. Belyea, K. C., appeared for Holt.

Dr. Clarence J. Webster, of Shelburne, delighted and interested a large audience in the Natural History rooms last evening, when he gave an illuminating account of the life of Sir Brooke Watson, the penniless one-legged boy who rose to be lord mayor of London, was the first agent of New Brunswick in England, and the best friend the province had in its formative days and in whose honor Brooke's ward, in Carleton, was named.
