FIVE DEAD IN P. E. I. FAMILY

Father Critically Ill and Seven Other Children Down With Influenza or Pneumonia.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., March 6.—Since last Tuesday five children of William Watts of Hampshire, nine miles from Charlottetown, died from pneumonia developed from influenza. They were aged four, fourteen, eleven, eight and six. Their father is critically ill and the other seven children are also down with the disease, but so far their condition is not dangerous.

MISBRANDED FISH SEIZED.

Based on information filed with the United States marshal, 1,710 pounds of misbranded "Canada Cod" said to be "hake," was seized by the pure food department of the government at Boston and as soon as those responsible for the alleged fraud have been located arrests will follow.

There were fifty-seven boxes in all, each containing thirty pounds; forty-seven were forwarded from Eastport, Me., to Lynn, and the remainder to this city. The food is alleged to have been shipped by the Beaver Harbor Trading Company of New Brunswick on several occasions from Eastport, Me.

The complaint states that through the branding it was an imitation offered for sale, not intended for export purposes.
