War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREAT-ER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

PREVENT GRASSHOPPER DAMAGE

In districts where grasshoppers are abundant, farmers and gardeners should co-operate and arrange to fight the insects at the same time. The young hoppers hatch in May, the exact date depending upon local meteorological conditions. As soon as they are noticed to be destroying crops, either of the following mixtures should be used early in the morning, about the time the insects begin to move about after their night's rest: (1) Bran—20 pounds; Paris green or white arsenic—one-half pound; cheap molasses—2 quarts; oranges or lemons—3 fruits; water—2 to 2½ gallons. The bran and poison are mixed thoroughly in a wash tub while dry. The juice of the fruit is squeezed into the water and the pulp and peel are added after being cut into fine bits. Then add the molasses and when the whole is thoroughly mixed, pour it over the dry bran and poison, stirring constantly so as to dampen the bran thoroughly. The other mixture is as follows: (2) Sawdust—20 pounds; Paris green—one-half pound; salt—one-quarter pound; water—3 gallons. The quantities given here would make sufficient for a fair-sized community and it might best be handled in this way.

Children's Good Work.
The children of the Protestant schools in Montreal contributed during the two years ended June, 1917, \$11,665.15 in money for the Red Cross. Their busy fingers and untiring devotion produced Red Cross supplies to the number of 84,790 pieces. Among these were: 1,787 pairs of socks, 51 fracture shirts, 6 day shirts, 188 comfort bags, 16 pajamas, 25 pairs of slippers, 189 surgical dressing caps, 1,460 mufflers, 697 polo caps, 288 wristlets, 1,564 pillow slips, 48 sheets, 388 eye and chin bandages, 405 hand-tied bandages, 788 triangular bandages, 87 abdominal, 55 head and 9,241 of the 2½-inch bandages.

This year's collection up to May 1, amounts to \$6,160.89, with no falling-off in the pieces of hand work. This is truly a record of which to feel proud.

No Relief in Sight.
There is said to be very little indication of any relief in the near future from the shortage in hosiery in the United States. There are not many U. S. mills which are in a position to accept any more business, and few of them feel confident that they will be able to make delivery on all the orders they now have on their books. Formal openings

have long since been out of the question, and there is not thought to be any likelihood of their being resumed until after the war is over. Orders that come in from day to day are said to be more than enough to keep the mills going as hard as they can under present conditions. Cotton merchandise is easier to get than woollen, but even cotton is hard to find in any quantities.

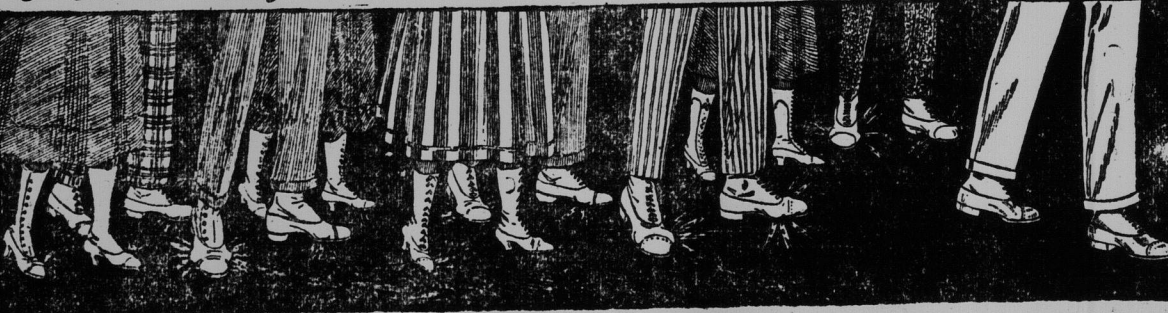

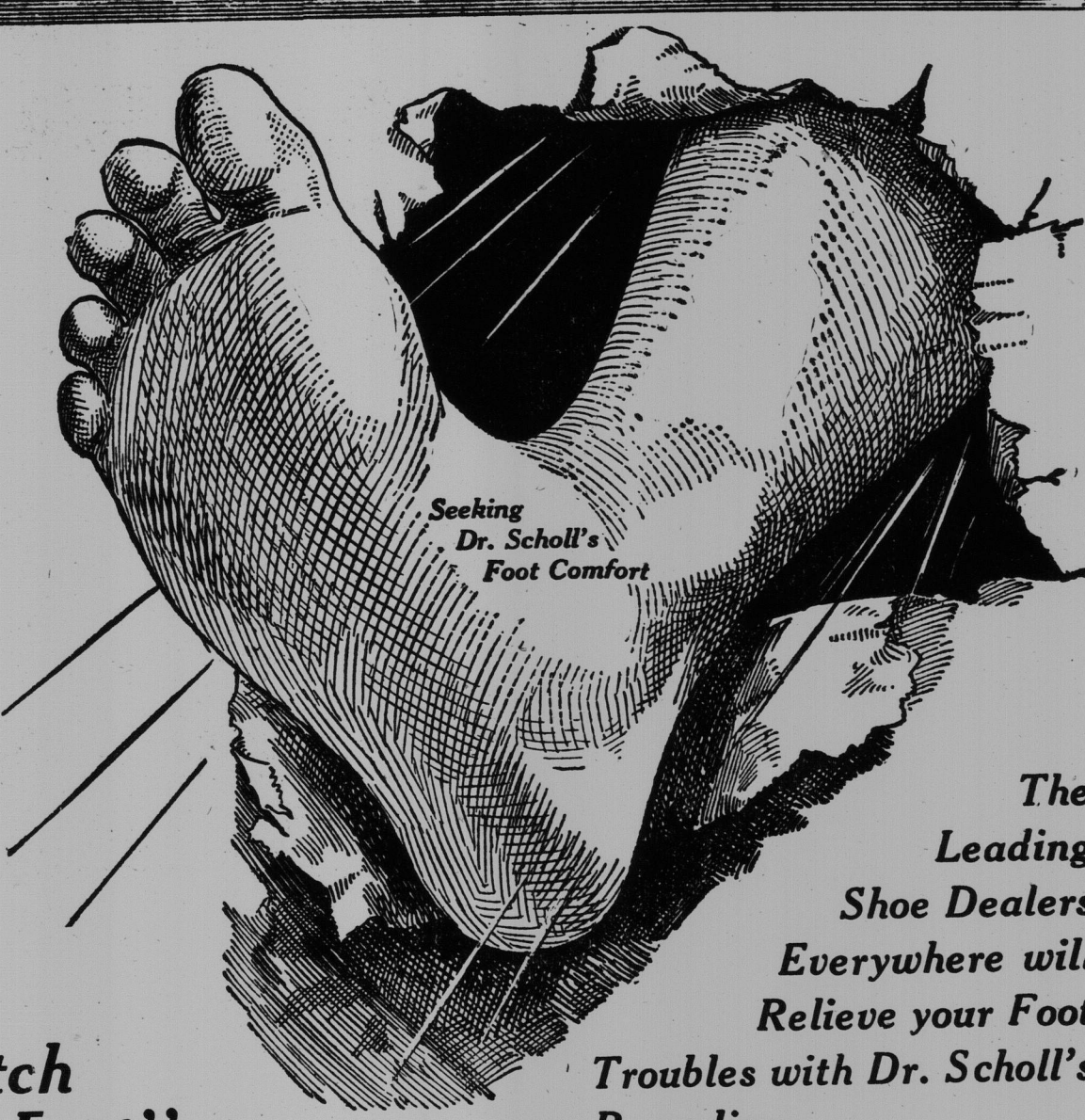
