Duncan McMartin President of Norton Griffiths Dredging Company

DREDGE BEARS HIS NAME

Only 45, But Had Amassed Large Fortune in Mining Development and Was One of Montreal's Business Chiefs

The announcement of the death of Duncan McMartin, of Montreal, which occurred in a private hospital in Toronto last evening after a short illness from pneumonia was heard with regret in St. John where he had some warm friends.

Mr. McMartin was the president of the Norton Griffiths Dredging Company since the organization of the company in August, 1912, and was heavily interested in the company financially.

The deceased, who was a native of Glangarry, will be interred at Williams-town. He leaves his wife and three children.
