

STATE RIGHTS ISSUE RAISED IN HYDRO CASE

made available for it. Eugene Lafleur, K. C., representing New Brunswick, opposed this plea, declaring that as only private property interests were affected, the state could not claim that any sovereign right was concerned.

Mr. Lafleur contended that satisfaction of the claims of the riparian property owners, 80 per cent. of which had already been agreed upon and the other 10 per cent. of which he thought could be agreed upon within two weeks, was all that was necessary for the commission to give assent to the undertaking.

MAINE'S CONTENTIONS.
Mr. Hackworth contended that Maine as a state would be concerned with the flooding of any part of its territory that if the project included the flooding of half the state, its sovereign rights to prevent such would be plain and that the same principle applied in the case of smaller area affected. Therefore, he said, Maine claimed a proportion of the power developed should be available to it before it could assent to the project.

COMMISSION SUPREMACY.
Mr. Lafleur, delineating the powers of the Waterways Commission under the treaty between the two countries, thought that in the matters with which they were appointed to deal their decision was supreme, and that the two countries had resigned their sovereignty to the commission in the treaty.

GREAT PROGRESS MADE.
Greatest progress of the day was made at the morning session when the International Paper Company with its subsidiary, the Grand Falls Company, Ltd., the C. N. C. P. and Bangor & Aroostook Railway announced through their representatives that they had come to agreements with the New Brunswick government concerning the location of their property and indemnity for damage. The agreements were verbal, but all felt sure they could be made formal without difficulty. This disposed of 90 per cent. of the riparian holders concerned by the Grand Falls project and relieved the commission of dealing with these claims.

OTHERS TO BE ADJUSTED.
Claims of the Saint John Lumber Company, for which Leonard Pierce, their attorney, appeared, and other smaller owners, remain to be adjusted. While no details of the agreement reached were given out, it was said in some quarters that the settlement with the International Paper Company was for less than the \$1,500,000 which was said to be their claim.

CONFIDENCE IN VENIOT.
Hon. Peter C. Keegan, representing the Saint John Valley, introduced a humorous note by his whole-hearted advocacy of the development in the fact that the Government of Maine representatives might say. He said his people had been waiting for the development for 40 years and looked to it to give them their chance to live. He felt the New Brunswick Government would want a market for their power if they developed it. "I have confidence," he said, "in this great man," referring to Premier Veniot.

SPEAKS ON CONTENTIONS.
Mr. Lafleur in opening his arguments addressed himself to the contentions submitted at the morning session by the governments of the United States and the State of Maine, and especially to their claim to a proportion of the power.

The only interests, he said, which the commission could deal with under the treaty were proprietary interests. The commission had nothing to do with alleged sovereign rights. Such, if violated, were not subject to monetary compensation, but to international negotiations.

RIGHTS ACQUIRED.
"If we acquire," he said, "as we intend to acquire, all riparian rights, surely we shall have satisfied all rights of riparian owners. It is not contended that the United States has any proprietary rights. We have already acquired rights with 80 per cent. of the riparian owners. It is inconceivable that if we have received rights from those to whom we have paid on their property, that there can be any objection."

CONTENTIONS DEALT WITH.
He dealt specifically with the main contentions of the United States representatives as follows:
Demand for export of power: "Any power derived is from backing up of water on private lands and not lands of the United States or Maine."
Compensation of all property owners: "That we are ready to do."

MATTER FOR COMMISSION.
Request for international board of two engineers to supervise erection of dam and provide a guarantee against flood conditions of the stream. "That is a matter for the commission's consideration."
That the commission's approval of the project should be subject to modification or revocation by either government should it be determined that the damage resulting: "I don't think it is practical that the matter should be left indefinitely open."

SOVEREIGN RIGHTS DENIED.
With regard to the request that provision be made against an export tax, Mr. Lafleur did not think it necessary to discuss that because it was disposed of in his contention that there was no sovereign right involved in giving Maine right to a proportion of the power.

Mr. Lafleur pointed out that the question of power exportation in the Grand Falls case was far-reaching, because it might be used as a precedent and this was undesirable in view of the

EXPORTATION POLICY.
Commissioner Senator Clark—"Other provinces are exporting now."

EXPORTATION POLICY.
Commissioner Sir William Hearst explained that in the case of Ontario present exportation was under long-term contracts which had been made some time ago. He thought the present Ontario policy and that of Quebec was against exportation.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL I. C. Rand, of New Brunswick—"We don't admit any right on the part of the State of Maine to participate in the use of the power. If we come to any concession it would be a matter of principle."

EQUAL DIVISION URGED.
Mr. Hackworth replied to Mr. Lafleur on behalf of the United States government saying—"It is not a question of indemnity we are contending for, but it is a matter of equal division of use of these boundary waters. This is not an academic question."

The State of Maine, he said, was entitled to a portion of the power developed which would bear the relation to the total power development approved by the commission for the protection and indemnity of all riparian owners.

POWER OF COMMISSION.
Senator Clark—"Can the commission do that?"
Mr. Hackworth—"They can make it one of the conditions of approval, and if the New Brunswick Electric Commission cannot comply, they can't operate."

Concluding Mr. Hackworth said—"If the State of Maine wished to use part of the land submerged and could not, it would be deprived of one of the principal rights of sovereignty, the right to take over any use property. The state may never want the use of this property, but the principle is the same."

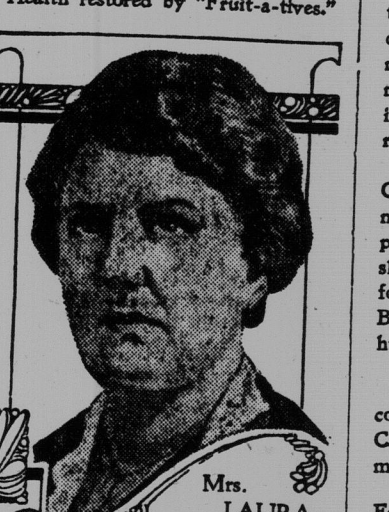

Questions Power of Waterways Body

MONTREAL, May 15.—Canadian Chairman Charles A. McGrath, of the International Joint Waterways Commission at this afternoon's session here, raised the question of the power of the commission to make a decision on any matter while the present vacancy in the United States membership remained.

Commissioner Senator C. D. Clark, Wyoming, said it was rumored that a United States appointment would be made very shortly, presumably in time for the forthcoming decision on the New Brunswick application to develop hydro power at Grand Falls.

Under the treaty creating the commission it is to consist of three Canadian and three United States members, with secretaries.
