As tanners have not been able to obtain prices for leather pro-portionate to the increased cost of hides they have practically withdrawn from

they have practically withdrawn from the market. IWthin the last few days there has been a bad break in western packer hides, which must have a similar effect on country and other hides. Hides are now approaching the season of their poorest quality, and many grubs are showing, and this also has a depressing on values.

"Calfskins have been rather erratic as regards demand and prices; they are quite strong now, with the greatest demand for light skins weighing seven oounds and less.

"Wool has been quite consistently strong for the last few months, and rices have advanced. Woolen and contiting mills are buying sparingly as hey have been unable to get correponding advances for their products; a fact, some of the larger operators in the United States have put out prices or spring goods at lower levels, therey indicating that they expect to buy tool on a lower basis."
