[Passed April Sessions, 1858.]

For every cord of wood or chaldron of coals, if carried the length of three town blocks, 2s. and 3d for each additional block. 36 bushels of salt, grain or potatoes, or any other articles measured in like manner at the same rate.

Pipe of wine, gin, brandy, and punch or rum or hogshead of sugar, or molasses, and housing within the door of the first floor, 2s. 6d. for the first three blocks, and 4d for each additional block.

For a tierce of sugar, or hogshead of punch or cider, and storing, for the first 3 blocks 1s. 6d; and 3d additional for each block.

For a hogshead of wine, or hogshead or crate of earthenware, or two tierces of earthenware, a hogshead of dried fish, two tierces of coffee, or quantity in bags not exceeding 12 hundred weight, or a common load of household goods, for the first three blocks 1s. 3d; and 3d additional for each block.

For cables and cordage in coils above 4 cwt., or if to coil per ton 2s for the three first blocks; and 4d additional for each block.

For hay loose per ton, 5s.
For hay, screwed, per ton, 4s.
For lumber per 1000 feet 2s for the first three blocks; and 3d additional for each block.

For a load of shingles, hoop poles, staves, heading, loose dried fish, treenails, smoked fish in boxes, salmon in kids, dry goods, or a load of articles not herein before mentioned, 9d for the first three blocks, and a penny half penny additional each block.
