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IS IT PREFERENCE?

Sir William Lyne's New Budget Harshly Criticised.

AUSTRALIA'S LATEST TARIFF

Protectionists Are Pleased—But Others Denounce It as Sham—Preference to Great Britain Estimated at From 5 to 11 1/2 Per Cent.—New Duties Will Produce £800,000 Every Year.

London, Aug. 9.—(C.A.P.)—At Sydney, Australia, the new budget expounded by Sir W. Lyne is regarded by protectionists as a triumph for preference, while free traders call it a sham preference. At present a close analysis of the tariff is impossible, but there is approximately an average of 5 per cent. in favor of Great Britain. Premier Deakin was absent from the House through illness.

Cook (opposition leader) analyzed the preference lengthily and said: "There is no preference on large agricultural machinery, but on hundreds of machine parts Britain receives special consideration. The new duties are estimated to produce £800,000 annually. Bills extending protection to the consumer are promised later. The Melbourne Age (Protectionist) says that many doubt the wisdom of the preference, seeing that the English Government unambiguously, even contemptuously, rejected the principle of the Imperial Conference, and says it is doubtful whether it consists with our dignity or prudence to offer a gift which the recipient treats with levity."

Another estimate of the British preference makes it average 11 1/2 per cent., or an annual value of £1,200,000.

MAN CUT TO PIECES.

Quarrel at Beauce Leads to Horrible Murder.

Quebec, Aug. 9.—Another tragedy unfolded in language, as the result of which a man named Cyrille Vachon lies at death's door. The scene of the tragedy was St. Evariste, Beauce, and the man accused of the act of violence is Napoleon Lessar, formerly of St. Evariste. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any person desiring to acquire Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any man over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
