City Health Board. Halifax, N. S., November 24th, 1913. BY-LAW to amend By-law No. 5 of the By-laws of the City Health

By-law No. 5 of the City Health Board hereby amended by adding thereto, mmediately after section 6, the followng section:
(6A) No blood, meat offal or other re-(6A) No blood, meat offal or other refuse, at any slaughter house, in the City of Halifax, shall be fed to any hog or other animal, either at the slaughter house or any other place.
