The death of John Vye occurred at his home in Nelson on Tuesday after a long illness. The deceased, who was 85 years old, leaves a wife, four sons and three daughters.

He was knocked down and appeared seriously injured. He attempted to resume his work shortly afterwards, but was compelled to leave owing to his injury.
