DENIES THAT FRANCE HAS ISSUED ULTIMATUM

Negotiations With the Porte Still Pending.

PARIS, May 16.—The Foreign Office today denied the report that France has issued an ultimatum to the Porte under the terms of which diplomatic relations between the two governments shall cease in ten days unless Turkey fully recognizes the rights of French subjects in the matter of the Hejaz Mines. The negotiations are still pending.

SCOTT ACT INSPECTOR MADE SEVERAL RAIDS

GLACE BAY, N. S., May 16.—The authorities made it not for the liquor men here last night. The license inspector, Duncan MacDonald, assisted by the chief of police and his officers, made seven raids upon prominent saloons where liquor was known to be sold contrary to the Nova Scotia license act. The saloons were entered by the inspector, and search warrants were issued. The dealers must have been forewarned in some way, as the inspectors only found a very small quantity of liquor in the houses visited. The total quantity found was not more than \$50 worth. The inspector secured much evidence and search warrants will be used later in prosecution of the dealers.

CELEBRATES ITS 50th ANNIVERSARY

Appropriate Services at Leinster Street

Pulpit Occupied by Rev. E. W. Kelly, a Former Pastor.

The celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Leinster street Baptist church began yesterday. Largely attended services were held both morning and evening and in the afternoon the Sunday school observed its fiftieth anniversary with a special service.

On Tuesday evening Lieut. Colonel McLaren will deliver the fourth of his series of lectures on Sanitation in No. 2 Field Artillery Unit Corps rooms, Old-fellows' Hall, Union street. Colonel White D.O.C., in their drill shed, Charles street. Colonel Buchanan is in charge of the cadets and feels sure they will make an excellent showing.

On Friday evening the Hibernian Cadets will hold their first march out of the season. Major Kitchin will be in command. The cadets have now the largest corps of its kind in the city and their number is increasing rapidly. A great turnout is expected.

MR. MILLICAN FAINTS AS HORSE RUNS AWAY

At eight o'clock last evening a horse with wagon attached dashed around the corner of Paradise Row and Main street at a furious clip but was brought up by Policeman Semple before any damage was done.

The animal turned out to be the property of Terminal Agent L. R. Ross, who had taken a drive out to the Sandy Point road, accompanied by Conductor Millican of the I. C. R. When some distance from the city, Mr. Millican and entered a friend's house. A gust of wind blew Mr. Millican's hat off and he alighted to recover it. While he was doing so the horse took fright and started off. Then suddenly Mr. Millican was seized with a fainting spell and fell into the ditch at the side of the road. A young man, named Pedersen, son of W. Pedersen, horist, who lives nearby, saw the horse start and followed it to the city. The animal attempted to enter its stable when it reached Mill street, but collapsed and was taken to the city.

The Sun called up Mr. Ross last night regarding Conductor Millican's condition, and was informed that he seemed to be himself again.

THOUGHT HE WOULD LAND AT NEW YORK

C. M. Cody, a Demerara government official, who is on his way to New York, arrived in the city yesterday on the West India steamer Ocamo. When seen by the Sun last night, Mr. Cody, who is a typical Southerner in appearance, said that he was unable to make his business public. He did not intend to come via St. John and thought when he went aboard the vessel at Demerara that the boat would land him at New York, but after starting he was informed differently and consequently he had to make a considerable detour from his way. He said they had an enjoyable trip, but refused to discuss business conditions in the West Indies.

George Durrant of St. Vincent also arrived on the same boat and both night reading Conductor Millican's destinations in the United States.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH WINDOW UNVEILED

A handsome memorial window was unveiled in St. James' church yesterday morning at the 11 o'clock service. The window was presented to the church by Mrs. R. W. W. Frink and J. H. Turnbull of Winnipeg in memory of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. John E. Turnbull.

The window was unveiled by the rector, Rev. J. Edward Hand, who spoke briefly. The unveiling was followed by the singing of the doxology.

EDMONTON'S DEFAULTING COLLECTOR SURRENDERS

EDMONTON, Alta., May 17.—Captain Neville Harbottle, Edmonton's defaulting collector of inland revenue, returning to Edmonton, surrendered to the Mounted Police, and was released on bail of ten thousand dollars. He is a brother of Captain Colin Harbottle, recently sentenced to four years for robbing the Toronto Club, and many think one brother sacrificed himself to raise money to clear the other.

There Will be Two March Outs, an Inspection, and a Lecture.

Church Celebrates Its 124th Anniversary

Montreal Divine Preaches Two Interesting Sermons to Large Congregations

The 124th anniversary of the founding of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church here was celebrated on Sunday morning and evening with services appropriate to the occasion.

St. Andrew's church was organized the year after the Loyalists landed and since that time service has been regularly held. The first minister was Dr. Burns. Many have occupied the pulpit since Dr. Burns' time, not a few of whom were distinguished divines.

Last year Rev. Dr. Gordon (Ralph Connor) conducted the anniversary services, and this year Rev. Dr. Barclay of St. Paul's church, Montreal, presided. In the morning Dr. Barclay selected his text from Romans and took for his subject Hope. The sermon was impressive and interesting. The speaker explained the true and expansive meaning of the word implied.

The choir rendered a beautiful anthem, Send out Thy Light, and the service closed with the benediction.

In the evening Rev. Dr. Barclay preached to a large congregation and his text was taken from John xix. "They parted My raiment." The speaker described the scene at the cross on Calvary and drew a beautiful picture of those who surrounded the scene of Christ's death. He described the Roman soldiers sitting at the foot of the cross and following out the Roman law, they parted the garment of Christ. He pointed out that many today were taking from the cloak of Christ the part of hypocrisy which was no more than what the Roman soldiers took.

The speaker dwelt for some time on the practices of the day. The young man asked "What would he do to inherit eternal life?" but the answer implied not pompous show but merely to follow Him.

Mrs. Curran sang O Divine Redeemer in a pleasing manner and the choir rendered the anthem Be Thou Exalted.

Tonight Rev. Dr. Barclay will lecture at 8 o'clock in the church on the subject Robert Burns, Lieut. Governor of Nova Scotia, and the collection will be in aid of the Sunday school.

WANT STEAMER ELAINE ON FREDERICTON-ST. JOHN ROUTE

FREDERICTON, May 17.—A special service will be held at the cathedral next Sunday, Victoria Day, when Dean Schofield will deliver a sermon to the South African veterans.

Work on the addition to the cathedral has been commenced, and it is expected to be completed during the summer.
