The News in Short Meter

Burglar Got Gold Ring. Thieves entered the store of Keith and Company, North Market street, on Monday night and secured a gold ring. This was all the booty they got.

Died in Salem. Captain J. F. Williams, master of the schooner Wanda, died in the Marine Hospital in Salem on Saturday. His family reside in Prince Edward Island. The news of Captain Williams' death was received by J. W. Ward Smith.

Big Hotel at Spruce Lake. John O'Regan has erected a large hotel at Spruce Lake. The building when finished will have 25 rooms and be thoroughly up to date in its appointments. There is no announcement as to when the hotel is to be opened.

Mr. Palmer Buys Lots. G. P. Palmer has purchased from Armstrong, Egan & Co. a site in Dale Place and will erect a house here for his own use. The plans for the house are being prepared in Montreal. The residence will cost from \$8,000 to \$10,000. Mr. Palmer expects to be in his new house by August last.

Shipwrecked Men in City. Capt. Lewis and the crew of the schooner Cloyola which was wrecked on Cross Island near Machiasport, Me., arrive in the city yesterday. The Cloyola, owned by William Smith, was on her way to Boston when she went ashore. The captain and crew had difficulty in getting ashore and saved only the clothes they wore.

PROVINCIAL. Candidates Chosen. Campbellton, May 21.—The opposition party in Restigouche county have nominated Hon. C. H. LaBilios and J. E. Mackenzie as candidates in the coming provincial elections.

GENERAL. Fruit Crops Damaged in Niagara Peninsula. St. Catharines, Ont., May 21.—It is believed that the heavy rains have done great damage to the fruit crops throughout the whole Niagara district. It is feared most of the blossoms have been ruined.

Strike May Be Averted. Montreal, May 21.—It is now hoped that the threatened strike of garment workers here will be averted. Negotiations are now under way for a conference which it is believed may go far toward removing the causes of complaint on the part of the workers.

Damage by Floods in Hamilton. Hamilton, Ont., May 21.—Thousands of dollars of damage was done by the flooding as the result of the torrents of rain that fell yesterday afternoon and last night. The flooded roads across the coal oil inlet where the city crosses the river and the international Harvester companies' plant are under a few feet of water and traffic on the Burlington and Oakville line is tied up.

Amateur Aviator Killed. Xenia, Ohio, May 21.—Fred J. Southard of Minneapolis, an amateur aviator fell 100 feet here while making an ascent today and was instantly killed. He had just bought the aeroplane from Wright Brothers and had been refused permission to take it out until he had acquired more experience. He, however, obtained the keys of the aviation school and started the machine with the result that his first flight was also his last.

IF ANY ADJUNCT, WON'T BE CANADA

Earl Grey Says No Question in His Mind Remembering Day in Toronto—Tribute to Duke.

London, May 20.—Presiding at the Royal Canadian Institute dinner which was attended by Viscount Milner, Earl Stanhope, Admiral Fremantle, Dr. George R. Parkin, and Sir Hartman Just, Earl Grey paid a glowing tribute to his Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, who, together with the Duchess, he said, had captured the hearts of the Canadians immediately upon his arrival. The people of the Dominion were conscious of having secured as their official chief a man who was not less conscious of their loveable qualities than for the distinction he enjoyed as a brother of the late King Edward the Seventh, and an uncle of the present King.

Recalling that Empire Day at Toronto when six thousand youths shouldered their rifles, proud of their ability to do their part in defence of the Empire, Earl Grey said that the Duke made one feel that if there should be any question of an "adjunct," Canada would not be that adjunct. Alluding to the fact that Great Britain bore the burden of the defence of the Empire, the speaker declared that thousands of Canadians were called by that thought. They envied the Duke's privileges and were counting the days until they could stand and claim their share.

Dr. George R. Parkin declared that the way in which Ambassador Grey had been treated by some people in the country was unjust. If only the leading statesmen of this country were more important than some of the men who had been so treated, he declared, it would have been different. He said that he had received so much attention.
