

SUFFERGETTES ARE SHOCKED

Announcement that Only Minor Offences Come Under "Cat and Morin Act" Upsets Plans.

London, Oct. 9.—The belief of the militant incendiaries that under the "cat and mouse" act they were assured of speedy release from prison by "hunger strike" and could then repeat their offence, received a rude shock today by the announcement of the home secretary that Miss May Richardson, who has been in prison since October on the charge of arson, and who has been refusing food since her arrest, would not be given her freedom. The prison authorities have been instructed to resort to force, if necessary, to prevent the incendiaries from starving themselves to death.

The Home Secretary says that the act will continue to be applied as heretofore, to minor suffergette offenders, whose crimes do not include acts of serious violence.

EXPLORER DISCOVERS NEW TRIBE

Missionary Meets Strange People in Interior of New Guinea—Women Wear Slit Skirt.

New York, Oct. 8.—The Rev. C. V. Hall, of California, now associated with the Methodist mission of Tolok Ayer, in Singapore, who has just ended a five years' trip around the world, returns to this country with an interesting tale of discovering a new tribe of negroes in the midst of the cannibals of New Guinea. This tribe, called the Kikis, and known only vaguely to other natives, was found by the five days travel through the hills with the Governor's son, two other white men and a troop of soldiers.

The travellers saw five Kikis under a tree and got a snapshot of them. The one female in the group looked so much like the tribe itself that they did not recognize her until she tried to get away. Then incidentally they found that she wore a new style of slit skirt made of coconut bark dropped over the head.

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LOAN SHARK IS ARRESTED

New York Usurer Charged 200 per cent. a Year—Wanted in Montreal and Winnipeg.

New York, Oct. 8.—David H. Tolman, notorious as a loan shark, was convicted this afternoon of violating the state law against usury and sentenced to serve six months in the penitentiary. The complainant, a clerk, testified that he had paid interest at the rate of 200 per cent a year for the use of \$10 for three months.

The defendant said he had conducted for twenty and fifty loan offices throughout the United States.

"This is the most flagrant case of usury that has ever come to the attention of the court of special sessions," said Presiding Justice Zeller. "Tolman, you are a most miserable usurer."

Warrants for Tolman's arrest on usury charges were issued some years ago in Montreal and Winnipeg, but he was careful to keep out of the jurisdiction of the Canadian courts.

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TO ENCOURAGE SCANDINAVIAN IMMIGRANTS

Hon. Dr. Roche Confident that Tide of Emigration from Northern Europe will Turn to Canada.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Oct. 9.—Trouble in the Balkans has had an opposite effect on immigration from those countries to Canada than was expected. Instead of a decrease there has been a steady increase of settlers from those countries and from Austro-Hungary to Canada. Recently the government has devoted considerable attention to attracting settlers from the Scandinavian countries to Canada. Owing to the hostility of the government of Norway, Sweden and Denmark toward any attempts to secure settlers from those countries, the work of the government has been carried on under great difficulty.

Recently the Department of Immigration has opened an agency in Copenhagen and will work in these countries from this centre. The success of the Norwegian, Swedish and Danish in the Western States and the Canadian West makes the government particularly anxious to add to the population as many possible of these people.

Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, is confident that the tide of emigration from the Scandinavian countries will be diverted to Canada.

Call for Tenders for Steamship Service Between Quebec and Natusquan.

Tenders for a Passenger, Freight and Mail Steamship Service are invited and will be received at the office of the Minister of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, until noon of the 15th day of December, 1913.

Tenders must be submitted on the printed forms for that purpose which will be supplied on application to the undersigned and to be sent in sealed envelopes addressed to "The Hon. the Minister of Trade and Commerce," and are to be marked: "Tenders for Steamship Service Between Quebec and Natusquan," and if submitted through the post should be registered.

The service is to consist of regular sailings from Quebec to Natusquan and return as follows: Every 10 days from such date as the ice conditions in the River St. Lawrence will permit up to May 15th; every 7 days from May 15th to November 15th; and every 10 days from November 15th until the ice conditions in the River St. Lawrence will no longer permit of the running of a steamer over the said route.

The Port of Call at each way shall be as follows: Les Escuminis, Manicouagan, Goulet, Point Des Monts, Trinity Bay, Seven Islands, Nottis, Shelburne, Grand River, Magpie, River St. John, Long Point, Mingan and Esquimaux Point, or such reasonable modification or variation thereof as may be determined from time to time by the Minister.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THIS rule head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the District Office of the Department of the Interior, or at the office of the District Agent of the Department of the Interior (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

1. The homesteader must be a Canadian citizen, or a person who has been domiciled in Canada for one year immediately preceding the date of application.

2. The homesteader must be at least 16 years of age, and must be of sound mind and body, and must be a resident of the Dominion of Canada.

3. The homesteader must have a bona fide intention of residing on the land to be homesteaded, and must have a bona fide intention of cultivating the land.
