TRUE BILLS

IN PIOTING

The grand jury in the County Court yesterday morning found a true bill against Percy Warren, Bedford L. Hines, William Brown, William Chambers, William Edmondson, William Day and Thomas Shannon, all charged with participating in the recent riot.

In the case of the King vs. Thomas Shannon a separate indictment charging the defendant with assault upon Policeman George H. Clark during the riot, the grand jury found no bill.

In addressing the grand jury, His Honor stated that he had lived in the city for fifty-four years and this was the first serious destruction of property on any occasion of this kind during that period. He also commented on the fact that Police Sergeant Kilpatrick, according to the evidence, has been twenty-five years on the police force and was present on the night of the riot, and saw no one he knew in all that crowd. He did not wish to criticize, he said, but thought that if all the police force knew the peaceful intentions of the rioters, they would have been driven to it, some of them.

The trial of the case of the King vs. Cambridge Goldsworthy, which was to have commenced yesterday morning, will take place this morning at ten o'clock.

AT SYRACUSE

FAST TIME AT SYRACUSE YESTERDAY

CENTENNIAL OF BIRTH OF EQUINE HERO

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 1.—Fast time marked the efforts of eleven horses participating in three races constituting today's grand circuit program at the New York state fair. Despite the small fields the racing was keen.
