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Sixty-five Panes Busted in Rink

Middleton, Dec. 22nd, 1924

Dear Mr. Editor:—

With your permission I wish to add a few words to what was published in your last issue in reference to the use of the rink for the coming winter, and the misuse of the same during the past few months.

In the first place, as already advised the Directors of this Middleton Rink Co. have leased the Rink for the ensuing Winter to the M. A. A. for a nominal sum. The Directors have kept in mind the purpose for which the Rink was built. This was undertaken to provide the town and nearby communities a place for winter indoor recreation and sport. Magnificent support was given to the scheme. The stock bought and thus far paid for with slight profits on the winter's operations since it was built, has paid for the building with the exception of \$1,000.00. The Directors this year hope to reduce this indebtedness to \$500.00. This can be done if the community continues to lend its generous support in the purchase of Season Tickets and otherwise as the M. A. A. may direct. I bespeak for the ticket sellers a cordial reception.

The misuse of the Rink above referred to, is evident in the fact, that Sixty-five panes of glass have been broken out during the past summer. It would seem that this had been done by persons bent on the destruction of property and absolutely unmindful of the fine provision made by the stock holders for the young people's pleasure.

I have been asked to call attention to these either thoughtless or deliberate acts, and to request that in the future a more considerate regard be shown for the preservation and proper use of a building erected for Community use.
