Runway construction begins

These are the days of decision . . . with the biggest one yet to come this week. Up to press time Transport Minister Paul Hellyer was still due to make his decision on the fate of the proposed expansion at Malton Airport.

A panel of judges, has turned down Mississauga council's request for leave to appeal the OMB's major Sherway decision. See page A10.
