MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRIME MINISTER: Level C167447

Last September we reluctantly agreed to lend John
Deutsch of this Department to help in the preliminary
organization of National Selective Service. It was clearly
understood and confirmed in writing that this was a temporary
arrangement for two months only. Early in November his time was
up, but the conditions in National Selective Service were still
so chaotic that we agreed, under pressure, to let him stay on till
the end of the year.

Mr.Mitchell and Mr.MacNamara are now pressing me very hard for a further temporary extension of the loan of Deutsch's services. I have told them that we cannot agree to a further extension because the economic work of the Department has increased very rapidly in recent months with the United Kingdom and United States both raising major questions of general international economic palicy, which we have to be equipped to study. Mr.Mitchell may raise the question of Deutsch's services with you direct. If he does so,I can say, with an absolutely clear conscience, that we cannot any longer get along without his services.
