The Provincial Govern't granted to this Society, to aid schools in 1855, £200, fifty pounds of which was applied to assist in training teachers in the Model and Normal School.	Saroha: A trained teacher acts as Catechist, very steady at his work. The Society has done good service here, and been faithfully represented. School suffers for want of good building, but has the advantage of the care of the Clergyman.
		12 10 0	25 0 0	50 0 0	Kildare: An experienced teacher, but should spend some months in Model and Normal School, which would make him most efficient. School well classified; attendance regular.
