CITY OF WINNIPEG.

Winnipeg, the capital and commercial centre of
Manitoba, was formerly known as Fort
Garry, and is situated at the Junction of
the Assiniboine with the Red River. It
contains a population of about 6000. Was
incorporated as a City in November, 1873,
and is divided into four wards, respectively
known as the North, South, East, and
West wards. The boundaries of the City
are as follows: "Commencing where the
northerly limit of lot 224 in the Parish of St.
John, according to the Hudson Bay
Company's Register, strikes the water's
edge of the Red River; thence North-
westerly along the said limit of said lot to
where the same intersects the eastern limit
of the main highway, from Winnipeg to the
lower parishes; thence along the said
highway southerly across the said lot 224;

thence North-westerly along the southerly
limit of the said lot to the rear thereof;
thence southerly along the rear of the lots
in the settlement belt to the westerly angle
of 249, originally bought from the Hudson
Bay Company by William Drever; thence
south-easterly along the southerly limit of
the said lot 249, to where the same would
be intersected by the extension of the
easterly limit of the street laid out by the
said Hudson's Bay Company between lot
pensioner's 54 and lot 1212, fronting on the
Assiniboine River; thence southerly, along
the east limit of the said street to the
water's edge on the said Assiniboine River;
thence along the latter, easterly to the Red
River; and thence down the westerly edge
of the same with the stream to the place
of beginning." The City is well laid out
with wide streets, Main street being the
principal, on which are already many fine
and handsome brick buildings, among which
are the dwelling of Mr. Hespeler, immigra-
tion agent, the under part being occupied
as offices, the Custom house, Dominion
Lands office, Hudson Bay Company's Land
offices, Bertrand & Prudhomme's dry goods
store, Cronn's Restaurant, the Ontario
Bank, the Merchants Bank, Hon. M. Ban-
natyne's extensive grocery establishment,
Ashdown's hardware store, Higgins,
Young & Jackson's and Higgins & Young's
extensive stores, Kew, Stobart & Co.'s
large establishment, N. Germain & Son's
hardware store, etc., etc., the General Post
Office and the new City Hall and Market.
In the course of the present year several
large buildings will be added. This fine
street will in a short time be nearly equal
to King Street of Toronto, or St. James
street of Montreal. The import entries at
the Custom House are rapidly increasing
every year. The value of lots within the
City limits range from \$50 to \$3000.
Among the educational establishments in
the City are the Central, and the North
Ward Public schools, the former attended
by pupils of an intermediate grade; the
latter is for primary pupils; the Manitoba
College, under the auspices of the Pres-
byterian Church; the Roman Catholic
Public School in the West Ward, and St.
Mary's Academy in the East Ward. There
is also in St. Boniface Parish, without the
City limits, on the East side of the Red
River, beautifully situated, St Boniface Col-
lege, under the auspices of the Roman Ca-
tholic Church, an excellent and popular
educational institution, established for
many years. St. John's College is a
similar institution, under the auspices of
the Church of England. It is also prettily
located in the parish of St. John's, just
outside the City limits, and has been in
existence for many years.

The Press is represented in Winnipeg by the
