

*Resolved*, That it is the opinion of this Committee, That if any unforeseen accident has happened, or shall happen, to any of the bridges or causeways on the great public roads of the Province, or the same shall be otherwise injured so as to interrupt travellers, it shall be lawful for his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor to order a Commissioner, or Commissioners, to repair or rebuild such bridge, or bridges, or causeways, or to remove any unforeseen obstructions which may impede travelling; and it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant-Governor, from time to time, to defray the expence of such repairs, out of the sum of three hundred and eighty pounds which remains unappropriated of the sum of five thousand pounds intended to be applied this ensuing year to the service of roads and bridges; and to draw Warrants accordingly in favor of such Commissioner or Commissioners, who shall account for the expenditure thereof.

*Resolved*, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that the sum of eighty pounds should be granted to Thomas Carwell, on account of his demand for materials and workmanship for the new Government-House, to the 1st October, 1806.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again on the consideration of a Supply; which report the House agreed to.

The said resolutions were read throughout a first and second time, and, upon the question severally put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk do carry the foregoing resolutions to the Council and desire their concurrence to the same.

A Message from the Council by Mr. Gautier:

Mr. Speaker,

The Council have agreed to two resolutions of this House for granting the following sums, viz.

£.380 for Roads and Bridges.

£.80 to Thomas Carwell.

And then the Messenger withdrew.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, to consider further of a supply to be granted for the support of his Majesty's Government.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair;

Mr. James took the Chair;

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee, that they had gone through the business to them referred; and that the Committee had come to several resolutions thereupon, on which they had framed a Bill for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the service of the ensuing year, and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered the Bill in at the Clerk's Table, where the Resolutions and Clauses therein contained were severally read throughout a first and second time, and, upon the question put thereupon, agreed to by the House.

On motion, the said Bill was read a first time.

*Resolved*, That the Bill be now read a second time: and the same was read accordingly.

*Ordered*, That the Bill be engrossed.

On motion of Mr. James, *resolved*, that the Clerk be directed by Mr. Speaker, to inform the Members who have been absent during the whole of the last and present Sessions, that if they neglect to attend the services of the House when next convened, their seats will be vacated.
