The Murderous Weapons.—A Dublin despatch says: The weapons used by the murderers of Cavendish and Burk were found in the rafters of a stable in rear of a house belonging to a man recently sentenced to penal servitude for intimidating Mrs. Kenny, widow of a man murdered in Seville Place, because he was suspected of giving information concerning the murderers. It is alleged Kenny was the driver of the car in which the assassins rode on the night of the murder. The weapons found were four knives, nine inches long with blades three quarters of an inch wide. They are quite new, very sharp, and evidently surgical dissecting knives. There were discolorations on them which, on chemical analyzation, proved to have been by human blood. It is hoped the murderers will yet be captured. The atthorities observe the strictest secrecy.
