The steamer Salsala, Capt. Purdy, sailed from Savannah Thursday for Havre and Honfleur.

The Kings County is a four-masted ship of over 2,000 tons register, built by the late C. B. Burgess of Kingsport, and is the second largest ever built in Nova Scotia.

The bark Glenville, which was recently purchased by the Dominion Coal Co., is to be used as a barge has been stripped of her sails and rigging.

The government steamer Aberdeen, Capt. Blos, left Halifax yesterday morning to change the bureau in the vicinity of Shelburne and Baccaro.

Wells Cole, Jr., of Port Greenville has sold his schooner Regina, 14 tons register, to Capt. Lawrence McGrath. She will be employed in the lumber trade from Parnboro and along the shore.

The C. P. M. steamer Lake Manitoba, Capt. Evans, sailed for Liverpool at 12 o'clock Saturday with a large general cargo, 200 passengers and 500 tons of cargo. She is to be returned to England.

N. Y. Shipping Illustrated says: Special advice from London state that there is inquiry in the market from D. A. R. S. S. Co. for a steamer with very large passenger capacity. This company operates a line between Boston and Yarmouth, and also owns the steamer Prince George, now on the New York-Bermuda run.

On board the Allan, royal mail steamer Corsican, which sailed for Liverpool via Halifax on Friday morning were eighteen persons placed aboard by the immigration officials. Nine of the number were brought here on Friday morning. Among them were one woman and four small children brought from Alberta, where her husband had

deserted the family some time ago, and they were left without a cent. They were taken aboard the Corsican and returned to England.

BOSTON. March 4—The Metropolitan S. S.
