

This latter is the best and almost a necessity for over watered lawns, where the roots of the grass have been exposed to the sun and air by too much sprinkling. It is a great mistake to imagine that a luxuriant green sward can be maintained by a continued application of water to the grass. If the sod is properly prepared to grow the grass, sprinkling with water need only be resorted to twice a week in very dry weather. The lawns then should be showered so that the moisture penetrates one half inch. These artificial showers should be applied during the evening after sunset, because no moisture is lost during this time by rapid evaporation as is the case during the deep in the water of the day.
