Failures which were looked for had prices at once repeated yesterday's leap of nearly 10 cents, did not develop among even the smallest traders. In consequence weakness rather than feverish strength characterized the close, with final values at virtually the lowest point of the day and 5-8 to 4-8 under last night.

WINNIPEG GRAIN MARKET.
WINNIPEG, July 29.—The excitement of Tuesday due to the war outbreak in Europe, was continued this morning on the wheat market, and on the curb there was heavy buying at 1/2c over Tuesday's close. This fact caused Winnipeg at the official opening to start off strong, comparatively, on the district, but they eased off in sympathy with American when their values were posted.

BANK OF ENGLAND TAKES MEASURES TO STOP THE SHIPMENT OUT OF GOLD

[By Special Wire to The Courier]
LONDON, July 30.—As has been anticipated the Bank of England today raised its minimum rate of discount an entire point, making it 4 per cent.

The step was taken as a protective measure in view of the chaotic financial conditions on the continent following the outbreak of war between Austria-Hungary and Serbia and the almost general advance of the bank rates in continental centres.

By discounting bills freely during the past few days while ordinary sources for discounting were practically suspended and by arranging credits in connection with gold coming from New York while American exchanges were so difficult to obtain, the Bank of England considerably relieved the financial world. Now, however, that a raid is being made on its gold supplies by the continent of Europe, the Bank of England has found it necessary to take protective measures.

—Something like \$5,000,000 in gold went out yesterday while France secured practically the whole of the \$5,000,000 which arrived from South Africa on Tuesday and although \$15,000,000 is coming from New York to pay securities sold recently, this sum can hardly arrive in time to offset any further continental demands.

The Bank of England return is expected to show a large increase in the loan business, a smaller gold stock and a sharp shrinkage in the proportion of reserve to liabilities which the higher bank rate and the expected gold arrivals will partly restore.

The continental financial and political situation, however, is so acute that it is essential for the chief financial institution in London to take measures of protection. The open discount market will be able to work more freely now that uncertainty has been removed with the establishment of a higher official minimum bank rate.

Absolute gloom prevailed today on the stock exchange. Yesterday's crop of failures added to the fact that there was no improvement in the European crisis had a most depressing effect. Brokers stood about in groups waiting for something to turn up but they declined to do any business. Quotations were somewhat under yesterday's figures but were purely normal and what little business was done was a matter of prolonged negotiation.

British Consols opened at yesterday's low record of 99 1/2, which was 1 1/2 point below yesterday's closing price. They quickly recovered 1 1/2 point however to the price at which the government broker was buying.

The only other transactions heard of were in Canadian Pacific which opened at 167 and then fell to 165 1/2 or 1-2 below parity.

The hammer whose tapping on the desk announces failures on the stock exchange was heard early to-day when another firm with large continental connections announced that it was unable to meet its obligations. All the failures thus far announced have been of firms which do continental business.

The change in the bank rate had no effect on the market as it had been anticipated.

Complained of Police Interference.

Mr. Hugh Elliott, druggist and lessee of the house Robinson rented, stated that he saw Dr. Robinson on July 15, when the latter complained of the "interference of the police with his business," but was not aware of the actual date of his disappearance.

Testimony as to Visits to Doctor
Blanche Yorke's coat and hat were seen hanging in Dr. Robinson's office on July 8 by Mrs. Laura Ross, who visited the doctor for medicine. This witness' description of the clothes was identical to that given by Miss Walsh and tended to prove conclusively that Miss Yorke was treated by Dr. Robinson on the evening she is supposed to have met her death.

Another witness, Mrs. Irving, also gave similar evidence. Several other witnesses spoke of the visits of the late Miss Yorke to Dr. Robinson's home.

The hearing will be resumed at 10 o'clock this morning.

Dr. Robinson Still Missing
KINGSTON, July 30.—The mother of Dr. C. K. Robinson and his married sister, who reside in this city, declare they do not know where Dr. Robinson is. When seen to-day they were in utter ignorance of the awful discovery at Farmworth.

Dr. Robinson was in Kingston for several days during the week of July 13th, but the last seen of him was on the steamer America on the 16th, when he crossed to Cape Vincent. This information comes from a relative who was with him. It is not thought that he returned after that. New York would likely be his goal.

His friends here can offer no explanation for his alleged complicity in the Yorke case. He served as house surgeon in Kingston General Hospital in 1912, and was a very quiet young man.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not in certain districts) residence upon and Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land. If of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after ceasing homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

stores were closed and blinds were drawn at every house. The residents stood around in little groups near the courthouse where the body was taken for the post-mortem, and later the inquest that they are both astonished and perplexed over the recent happening is seen. They stared at strangers as though suspecting their complicity. Large numbers drove many miles to attend the preliminary hearing to learn at first hand what has really taken place so far as can be learned in connection with the deceased girl during the past few weeks.

After the autopsy was performed by Prof W. T. Connell, pathologist, at Queen's University, the remains were placed in a casket and conveyed to the undertaker's for burial to-day, but the service will be held in the Methodist church on Friday.

Morbid Interest in Inquest

The body was conveyed to the hearse through a file of bareheaded village mourners. A rush for admission to the courtroom was made by men and women alike when the doors were opened for the inquest, before a crowd of morbidly interested school children who flocked round the entrance while the room was packed to capacity, making the heat almost unbearable.

Coroner Cowan of Napanee at the outset asked if any representative of Dr. C. K. Robinson was present, suggesting that he would have the liberty no such person was in attendance, and the inquiry proceeded.

Witness Tells of Search

The first witness to be called was Mr. Richard Richardson, who testified to making the search in the Robinson home on Tuesday. He declared that his reason for calling in the assistance of the bailiff was to seize property which had not been paid for. Richardson recited his experiences in company with Mr. Taylor, telling how the furniture was disarranged and some articles were missing, which he caused a more thorough search to be

made, and the ultimate discovery of bloodstains on the bed, floor, wall and articles of clothing.

Mr. J. Taylor, a furniture dealer in the village, corroborated the declaration of the first witness. Questioned by Crown Attorney C. H. Preston of Napanee, the witness described the various articles of a man's wearing apparel which he discovered stained with what he thought was blood.

He said he had known Blanche Yorke all her life but did not remember when he last saw her alive. When asked if he could identify the much decomposed body as the remains of Blanche Yorke, Richardson settled the question of identification.

"In what condition did you find the body?" asked the attorney.

"I saw the legs were cut off just below the knee, but could not find the dismembered portions."

Dr. Robinson Professed Ignorance

Taylor informed the coroner that he had questioned Dr. Robinson regarding the disappearance of Miss Yorke, who said: "Yes, it is strange, and I cannot imagine where she may have gone," and further professed ignorance of her whereabouts.

Report of Autopsy

That Miss Blanche Yorke died of hemorrhage brought on by an illegal operation was the report of Prof. Connell. He declared that the remains were in an advanced state of putrefaction, as would be natural with a body which had been dead and buried three weeks, and further added that he discovered no external marks of violence on the remains. The body of the child was also examined by Dr. Connell, who pronounced it normal, though prematurely born. Dr. H. W. Wilson, who corroborated the report further declared that the late Miss Yorke called upon him a few months ago, asking for a tonic. He then learned of her condition.

Said She Was Coming Back

The daughter of Miss Blanche Yorke's erstwhile employer, Miss Agnes Walsh, when called to the stand declared that she walked with the deceased to Dr. Robinson's office on or about July 8. "Blanche said she was going to Dr. Robinson's to get medicine," stated Miss Walsh "that was the last I saw of her, that she was coming back to work the next day."
