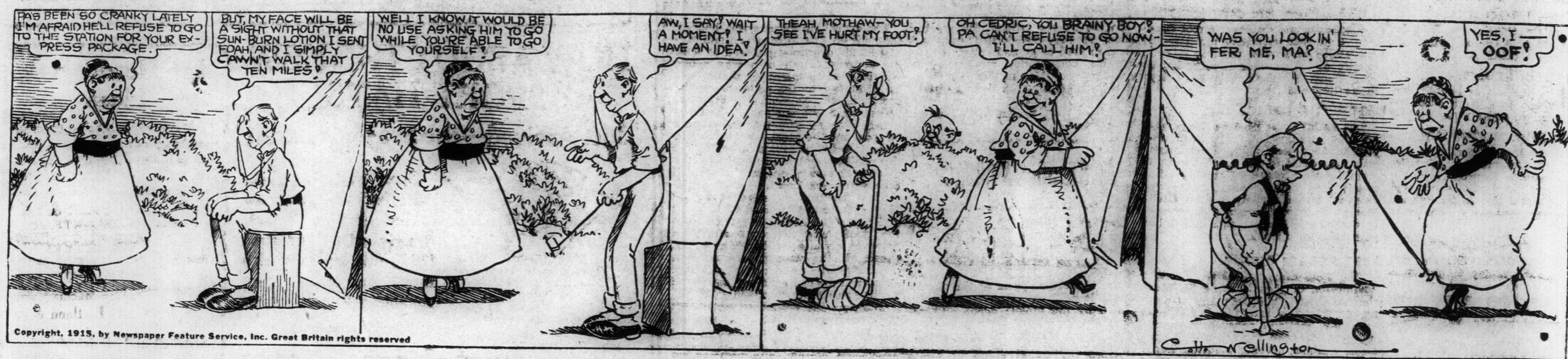

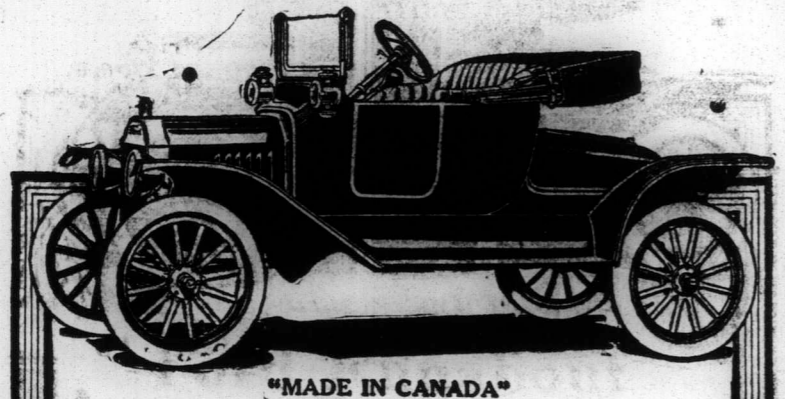
**BRANT'S BREAK EVEN AT LONDON SATURDAY**

London Free Press: Only a spectacular one-handed catch in the outfield by Lamy stood between the Brantford team on Saturday and another two-fold victory over the lamented Tecumseh when 3 Brants occupied the bases, and Mike Mullin drove out what looked like a three ply hit. As it was the locals were pushed to hold the score to 6 to 5 in the second game, while the hard-hitting Red Legs annexed the early pastime by 6 to 1.

**EVERS CLAIMS THAT HIS SAYINGS ABOUT LEAGUE RACE WERE MISAPPLIED**

Boston Mass. July 19.—Remarks alleged to have been made from the side lines by Capt. Evers of the Boston Braves during last Tuesday's baseball game with the St. Louis Cardinals, are to be the subject of the investigation which President Tener will make here to-day according to an announcement from New York. The Braves' captain, taking exception to Umpire Riegler, who declared Bob Bescher safe at the plate on a close play, was quoted in a newspaper as having shouted: "They're trying to get the crowds out; they've ordered a close race; leave them alone boys; they're only following instructions!" Evers later expressed indignation because his remarks had been interpreted as a claim that the National league race was fixed." He said: "I claim no such thing. I've been in baseball long enough to know better. To be sure, I might have said anything on the ball field. When an umpire hands you one like Riegler did at the home plate what you say will invariably be the result of hard fighting and anything you can get away with goes. Nobody living could fix a race like the one in the National league just now. It's the greatest ever and we all have a chance." "There is absolutely no truth in the story that Capt. Evers said that the National league race was fixed," declared Manager Stallings of the Braves. "I have personally made a thorough investigation of the report and find it to be false. Johnny Evers has been with me two years and a straighter and more honorable player cannot be found. Evers has devoted the best years of his life to organized baseball and it is absurd to suppose that he would attempt to tear it down. A few years ago he had an opportunity to jump to the outlaws. Instead he stayed by the organized ball and is now, as ever, one of its most loyal members."
