

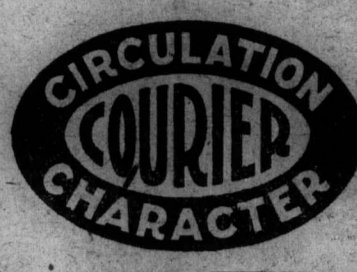

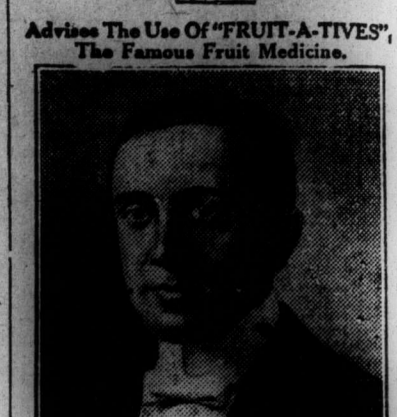
The pastor took for his morning subject "The Joy of Ingathering," and delivered a very inspiring and uplifting sermon on it. In the evening he spoke on "The Only Kind of Soil that Yields a Harvest." The sermon was taken from Christ's parable of the different soils that were sown in.

He made it very interesting by comparing our souls to these various grades of soil.

Many of us had cultivated lots this year, and they had cost us much more labour than we anticipated. After we had sown the seed (the work wasn't accomplished either). The weeds had to be constantly cut down and the ground worked, and so in our Christian lives, the weeds or bad habits had to be continually kept under. He also said that a good seed grown in good soil would bring forth good fruit, just so good thoughts sown in good children, makes good men and women. That whatsoever a man sowed that shall he also reap. So let us all be careful what we sow, and we to that man who soweth bad thoughts and words in our boys' and girls' minds. He said it was a mistaken idea about young men having to sow wild oats. If young men sowed wild oats, they would reap the same. But some sow the seed of their soul was too stony to bring forth good fruit. Any of us that have been out into the country and seen the fields a few years back, would have seen nothing but fields of rocks and trees. In the same way Christ can change our soil from stony ground into usefulness.

The choir, excellently in both services and great credit is due to each one of them for the able manner in which they took their parts. Large congregations gathered at both services.

Fifteen Zeppelin TOLL OF 15 LIVES IN AIR RAIDS

Zeppelins Beaten Off attacks Over Yorkshire Coast.

Two Foe Planes Penetrate London Defences, Do Little Damage.

CALL FOR REPRISALS

"Hit the Germans and Hard," Urges London Daily Mail.

By Courier Landed Wire—London, Sept. 23.—Persons were killed and injured in last night's air raid over London. The Zeppelin crossed the Yorkshire coast, penetrated inland, being off by gunfire. Three were injured. Only two at the most penetrated the London defences, reported officially.

The following official report given out by Lord French, Commander of the Home defences:

"Airplane raid: The last night's raid showed that the Yorkshire and which approached London was off by the fire of anti-aircraft. Only one, or at the most two, penetrated the London defences, reported by the police up present, are:

"Killed 15; injured 70. 'Airlship raid'—Enemy crossed the Yorkshire and shire coasts between midnight three a.m. There is no evidence of having penetrated to France inland. They were off from various localities, which they approached. Bombs were dropped slightly injured. Little damage was caused."

London, Sept. 25.—Reports from a Kentish town say that bombs were dropped in last night's raid. According to information from an Essex coast town, the raid of the night was 7.30 o'clock when anti-aircraft opened fire and the dropping of bombs could be heard about two hours at intervals far as could be learned, bombs were dropped, and there was no great progress.

The Daily Mail, in commenting on last night's calls for reprisals, says:
