**Mr. John McMillan**

Mr. J. McMillan, who has initiated many notable improvements since he became General Manager of the C.P.R. Telegraphs eighteen months ago, has just decided to inaugurate an important service entirely new to Canada over the hundred and ten thousand miles of wire under his immediate control, namely, the day letter which may now be sent between points in Canada on the Christmas Pacific system at a rate very much reduced as compared with the usual commercial rush telegram. Mr. McMillan is convinced that many of those who send telegrams would be quite satisfied if they arrived on the same day, where as a proportion of the cost of the rush telegram is due to the cost of speedy delivery. The day letter of fifty words will be rated at one and a half times the cost of a regular rush message of ten words and can still bring an answer the same day, which is as quick as many people desire. There are sixteen hundred C.P.R. telegraph offices throughout Canada, at each of which this new service will be in force, so that this will be a Dominion-wide service stretching from Louisburg, Nova Scotia, to Victoria, B.C. Messages will be taken in either French or English, code words not being permissible.



Mr. John McMillan owes his success to a genial and tactful disposition, which made him one of the most popular C.P.R. officials in the West, where his work continued until he was called to the head office in Montreal last year. Although less than fifty years of age, he joined the C.P.R. at his inception, working on construction in 1883. After acting for a number of years as operator at Donald, B.C., he became Inspector of Telegraphs at Winnipeg in 1902, Assistant Superintendent in 1908, Superintendent at Calgary in 1907, General Superintendent at Winnipeg in 1915, and finally Manager of the whole telegraph system in March, 1916.

A Bath at the British Recruiting Station in New York; Five Hundred Applied Yesterday.

NEW YORK, June 7.—The British recruiting station at 580 Broadway opened with a rush yesterday. More than 500 men applied and about 90 per cent passed the physical test, including George Hassell, of the "Oh Boy" company, Colin Campbell, Duncan Melnie, Leonard Muir, Roland Bottomley, Malcolm Denn and Roland Young; Jack Binas, who as wireless operator

was the hero of the steamship Republic disaster in 1906, went to the station to enlist in the aviation corps. Binas, who is now a newspaper reporter, is married and has two children. It is expected that he will be accepted.

George L. Venina, aged 22, waiter, has the honor of being the first subject of King George V to enlist in the British army on United States soil. He passed the examination yesterday and was mustered into the service immediately.

**EULOGY ON THE HORSE**

In an eloquent tribute to the horse written by that active friend of animals, Mr. George Foster Howell of Brooklyn, New York, and published in a recent issue of the Ledger-Dispatch, Norfolk, Virginia, occur these pertinent paragraphs:

"On the battlefield the horse faces the enemy as bravely as the most heroic soldier that ever carried a bayonet, and when shot and shell tear and rend his powerful body he gives up his life for man without a whimper—he utters only the groan of the dumb and speechless. It was he who delighted the hearts of kings, princes, and potentates. He is the useful servant not only of royalty but of the humbled human creature, he be peasant or even peddler.

"On the farm the horse's life is the average thoughtlessly boy who drives the grocery wagon. The youth no sooner jumps on the wagon than the reins are given a hard, sharp snip on the horse's back and he is kept going at high speed. When he wants to stop he hauls up the lines so suddenly and so violently as to almost pull the animal down on its haunches. Many of these irresponsible youths beat the horse with whip, and the welts thus made are always silent witnesses of the boy's cruel nature, but the groceryman is too busy to know or to care what happens to his horse, so long as he can sell groceries and deliver the goods.

"In dealing with the horse let us put ourselves in his place. Let us practise the golden rule. Suppose you were the horse and the horse the man, how would you like the horse to treat you? Answer that question honestly and the whole problem of justice and mercy to the horse and to all other animals is instantly solved satisfactorily."

**SODIUM FLUORIDE KILLS LICE**

By a newly tried remedy a poultry flock can be rid of all seven common species of chickens lice in a few days by one application of sodium fluoride. One pound of this white powder as dust, costing 40 or 50 cents through the local drug store, is enough to treat 100 fowls. If dissolved in water and used as a dip, the same amount will go three times as far. The finely powdered commercial form is cheaper and more easily applied by the dusting method than the fine crystallized sodium fluoride.

Holding the fowl by the legs or wings one pinch of sodium fluoride is applied each to the head, neck, back, breast, below the vent, tail either thigh and under side of each wing. Sodium fluoride is irritating to the nose and throat and will cause local irritation to the skin. The applicant must guard against it. As a dip the sodium fluoride is harmless and more easily solved at the rate of three-fourths to one ounce of commercial powder or two-thirds ounce of the chemically pure material to each gallon of water.

**Synopsis of Can Land Re**

**THE** sole head male over 18 years of age, a quarter Dominion land in Nova Scotia or Alberta. At person at the Dominion or sub-Agency for the proxy may be made Lands Agency (but certain conditions.)

Duties—Six months cultivation of the land. A homestead nine miles of his land at least 30 acres, of a habitable house in residence is performed. In certain districts good standing may section alongside his \$3.00 per acre, and Duties—Six months of three years after patent; also 50 acres Pre-emption patent soon as homestead conditions.

A settler who has stand right may take stand in certain districts. Duties—Must out of three years, erect a house worth The acre of cultivation reduction in case of tony land. Live situated for cultivation ditions
