LIBERALS LOSE FIVE SEATS CONTINENTAL SOLDIERS VOTE.

NOVA SCOTIA REPRESENTA-
 TIONS NOW STANDS 12
 GOVERNMENT TO 4 OP-
 POSITION.

The official soldiers' and
 naval vote taken in Canada and
 in the United States issued Mon-
 day by W. F. O'Connor, Gen-
 eral Returning Officer, increased
 the majority of the Union Gov-
 ernment in Parliament to 60.
 It was 45 when the civilian
 home vote was counted. The
 soldiers vote taken in Great Bri-
 tain has all been allocated to
 the four constituencies and a
 total of sixty officers commenc-
 ed to count it yesterday. Mr.
 O'Connor expects it will all be
 in by Wednesday when the Gov-
 ernment's majority may be fur-
 ther increased. The standing

RED CROSS LINER FLORI- ZEL WRECKED.

Forty Alive Out of One Hundred
 and Thirty-Seven on Board.

"S. O. S.—Florizel in distress
 off Cape Race"; and a few
 minutes later—"Florizel break-
 ing up." There messages, in-
 tercepted by the wireless station
 at Camperdown, brought to
 Halifax early yesterday morn-
 ing the first news of a terrible
 shipping disaster off the coast
 of Newfoundland. On board
 the ill-fated passenger steamer
 were a number belonging to this
 City, and many others having
 relatives here, and
 the news that the well-known
 steamer was in danger quickly
 spread.

Ran Ashore in a Blizzard.

The Florizel, the last of the
 Red Cross liners, left St. John's,
 Newfoundland, on Saturday
 night at eight o'clock for Hal-
 ifax. Early yesterday morn-
 ing, in a blinding blizzard, she
 ran ashore at a point twenty
 mile east of Cape Race, and
 forty miles from St. John's. Ex-
 posed to the full fury of the
 seas, the ship did not long keep
 water. Her after-deck was
 submerged and the lives of the
 137 souls on board—77 passeng-
 ers and 60 of a crew, were in im-
 mediate danger.

DUSSELDORF CAPTURED.

Copenhagen, Feb. 23—A
 despatch received here states
 that the German steamer
 Dusseldorf, en route from
 Tromsø, to Stettin, has been
 captured by a British auxil-
 iary cruiser.
