CONSERVATIVE ORGANIZER CONCEDES ONLY SIX SEATS TO OPPOSITION

W. H. Hastings Phones "The West" That Chances for Sweep Are Bright with Brown Among the Fallen--What Our Correspondent Says

Excitement is running high in the city over the Manitoba elections and almost any kind of a bet can be had on the results. The West was in telephonic communication with W. H. Hastings, Conservative organizer this morning, and he is confident that the Government will sweep the province. He is one of the best organizers in Canada, but he only knows the country as an operator knows his machine.

He will not concede more than six seats to the Opposition and the Government has bright prospects of defeating Ed. Brown in Portage la Prairie. Dr. McInnis is also regarded as a winner in Brandon. There is a big storm raging in Manitoba today and both parties find it difficult to get the vote out.

Winnipeg, March 6.—The two powerful political machines will come together tomorrow in this province, and what the result will be both parties seem equally confident of. The Government with a majority of twenty-one in the present House has big odds against the Opposition, but there is strong feeling throughout the country on the grain trade question and the congestion of railway traffic is an usual chinked up against the government.

The most favorable forecast that can be made from the Opposition standpoint, however, gives the Government a good majority and they will no doubt carry the two bye-elections in Gilbert Plains and Gimli, which are being held later.

In the constituency of Arthur, A. M. Lyle is regarded as a winner for the Government.

Assiniboia will probably return the sitting member, Jos. Prfontaine (Liberal).

In Avondale Jas. Argue the Government member will be returned.

Hamiota is doubtful. The Liberals have the seat at present.
Kilbride is also doubtful, as the big half-breed vote is very uncertain.

In Killarney Geo. Lawrence had an enormous majority the last election and it is L. Richardson who it will be the greatest victory of the campaign.

In Lakeside E. D. Lynch, Conservative member will no doubt win out. Lansdowne is the scene of a stiff and uncertain fight. T. C. Morris was defeated last time, but the Liberals are counting on him winning.

In La Verandrye the Liberal member will probably be re-elected. Manitou can be counted on as a safe Government seat.

In Minnesota Waddell (Government) ought to win.

London will be carried by George Ashdown, the sitting Conservative member.

Morris is doubtful as the Liberals claim that Hon. Collin H. Campbell will have a hard fight, but Government is hopeful.

Mounia is a Liberal seat, notwithstanding that McInnis, Conservative, carried it in the Opposition, and the Opposition ought to win.

In Norfolk, Bob. Lyons will be returned on the Government side.

Portage la Prairie is a problem that time alone can solve. The Government is exerting every effort to defeat the Liberal leader, Ed. Brown and the chances are good against him.

Rhineland is a pocket borough for the Opposition.

Rockwood has been Government for some time and the member is again in the running. He will probably be elected.

Russell will probably elect A. L. Bonycastle (Conservative) as the sitting member has retired.

St. Boniface is doubtful with the chances in favor of the Opposition.

PROVINCIAL RIGHTS CONVENTION

Meeting of Haultain Supporters Called for March 19th--Smoker in Evening

The Provincial Rights party of the Province of Saskatchewan will meet in annual convention in this city on Tuesday, March 19. At a meeting of the full executive recently held it was decided that the week of the provincial fat stock show would be a convenient time to call this political gathering, as the delegates would also be able to attend the functions of the Stock Breeders' Association lasting until the 21st. The local House being in session, Mr. Haultain's supporters in the legislature will all be in the city on that date.

Three sessions of the convention will be held, one in the morning, one in the afternoon, and in the evening the delegates will be the guests of the city association at a smoker in the city hall where the convention will take place. The arrangements are in the hands of the local executive and every effort will be made to have this gathering even exceed in numbers and enthusiasm the meeting held at Moose Jaw last year.

The Bishop and Mrs. Grisdale sail for home in Indian Head on the Empress of Britain which leaves Liverpool on May 17.—Indian Head Vidette.

BUSY SESSION OF COUNCIL

Expert Accountant Makes Favorable Report—Debtenture Awards—Other Tenders
All members attended the city council last evening except Ald. Gillespie and Ald. Wright who are absent from the city.
Two comprehensive warehouse trackage schemes for the northern part of the city were submitted by the city engineer.
J. H. Menzies presented his special auditor's report which eticogised the city treasurer.
Tenders for the \$180,000 debtenture issue were opened and are as follows:
