ers and Liberal organs that the customs duties have been reduced. The total net reduction in the tariff amounts to about 1 per cent., but under actual existing conditions the customs duties upon a pound or yard of any commodity imported into Canada are much heavier than they were in 1896.

"The price of all commodities imported into this country has largely advanced during the past ten years. This appreciation in price accounts for a portion of the increase in the volume of our foreign trade. The average increase in price would probably amount to 40 per cent. "Assuming the duty to be 29 per cent., instead of 30 per cent., as bein excess of the duty paid on the same quantity of the same article in 1896.

Thus the total cost to the importer in 1910 would be \$180.60.
