The Ontario Department of Agriculture recently issued a bulletin on Bee Diseases in Ontario, with directions for treatment. Foul brood, both American and European, are reported as existing in this country. The government inspectors are given full power to deal with apiaries having these diseases and may order the complete destruction of a diseased apiary if the owner resists his authority. American Foul Brood has already cost the government of Ontario hundreds of thousands of dollars.
