ABOUT HOT SPRINGS. "Hot Springs," says Mr. Crow, "is a wonderful place. Some 72 of these springs come up out of the mountain, and some of them are hot enough to boil an egg. The water has wonderful curative powers both to bathe in and to drink. I have seen people come to Hot Springs so crippied up with rheu-matism you would think they were just ready for the grave. In a few days you would find them flying round at the public dances. The government controls all the springs, and the revenues derived are all used in developing and beautifying the city. developing and beautifying the city. Hot Springs has a permanent population of about 15,000 and a floating population of about 15,000 more. Board there runs from \$1 to \$50 a day.
