





The writer of this has hunted deer for over twenty years, and during the time that it was legal to kill deer in the water he has seen many a pine clubbed to death hw men who excused their action by say. ing there was no use wasting ammun ition. The man who "still" hunts or shoots his deer ahead of the dogs in the woods, fairly earns his venison, But the game has no fair chance when t can be driven to the water and killed there. Lots of men now go hunting who are actually afraid to go five hundred yards into the woods for fear of losing themselves; hunters of this stamp wouldn't kill a deer in ten seasons, but when these same men are

located in boats on a lake and experi enced guides are hired to put out the dogs and run deer to the water-thus guarded they butcher them at their leisure. If an amendment to the Game Protection Act prohibiting the killing of deer in the water is submitted to the legislature this season is should be passed without a dissenting voice.
