shooting of deer in the water. when the Legislature passed a law prohibiting the practice, we never imagined it possible that it would be revoked, Such, however was the case, and though in answer to the circulars sent out by the Department the majority of the replies were opposed to the privilege being again granted, the Minister saw fit to disregard the protest and again allow the pot-hunters their way.

There is no more sport in killing deer in the water than knifing lambs in the slaughter house. The writer of this has hunted deer for over twenty years, and during the time that it was legal to kill deer in the water he has seen many a one clubbed to death by gen who excused their action by saying there was no use wasting ammun ition. The man who "still" hunts or shoots his deer ahead of the dogs in the woods, fairly earns his venison, But the game has no fair chance when it can be driven to the water and killed there. Lots of men now hunting who are actually afraid to go five hundred yards into the woods for fear of losing themselves; hunters of this stamp wouldn't kill a deer in ten seasons, but when these same men are located in boats on a lake and experi-enced guides are hired to put out the dogs and run deer to the water-thus guarded they butcher them at their leisure. If an amendment to the Game Protection Act prohibiting the killing of deer in the water is submitted to the legislature this season , should be passed without a dissenting voice. No true sportsman will oppose it.— Toronto Canadian Sportsman and L've Stock Journal, February 15, 1901.
