THIBODEAU & JACQUES**PUBLIC SCHOOLS TO TAKE HOLD**

Will Co-operate With Collegiate in Establishing Manual Training.

Teachers to be Paid on First of Month - May Rent King St. Building.

Perhaps the most important matter brought up at the meeting of the Public School Board last night was a discussion on the advisability of establishing manual training departments in the Public schools. Mr. Paterson, the principal of the Collegiate Institute, is taking a deep interest in this matter. The schools at Woodstock and other places have adopted this plan and it has been found to be very successful.

A committee, composed of Dr. McKeough, Mr. Heyward, Mr. McCorvie, Mr. Cornish and Dr. Bray, was appointed to meet with a committee from the C. C. I. Board, to consider the matter thoroughly.

There were present at the meeting Chairman Dr. McKeough, Dr. Bray, Mr. Robertson, Mr. Morley, Mr. Cornish, Mr. Heyward and Mr. McCorvie. Mr. Cornish moved that the teachers receive their salaries at the first of each month instead of at the last as is now the custom.

The motion was carried. A letter was read from Miss Abram, thanking the Board for her promotion.

A communication was read from the R. J. Graham Canning Company, offering \$20 a month for the use of the King St. property. This company intended to can apples in the city this fall and are looking for a suitable site.

A question arose as to the insurance. The rate would be much greater if the building were in use, and the Board would have to pay the extra premium.

Dr. McKeough expressed his opinion that this was an industry which would help the city and would employ a number of men and women, and he thought it would be advisable to let the Board netted but little for it. The building is not put in any use at present and so nothing would be lost by the Board, and many families in the city would be benefited.

The matter was left with a committee composed of Mr. Heyward, Dr. McKeough and the Secretary, to look up the matter of insurance and deal with the company accordingly.

Dr. Bray, for the Model School committee, reported that there are now 33 pupils in the school, an increase of three over last month.

It was decided to give the scholars of the Public schools a half-holiday to-day.

Mr. McCorvie, for the Building committee of the McKeough school reported progress.

Notwithstanding that 90 pupils passed the High School entrance examination from the city schools, and consequently are not now in attendance, the increase in the enrolment over June is 105, which means really an increase of 105. The increase in average attendance, notwithstanding the same loss, it will be seen that the enrolment for September is 23 higher, and the average 21 higher, than for September, 1901.

There were registered in the Central school 259 ordinary pupils, 102 kindergarten children, 33 Model school students, which, together with twenty teachers, makes a grand total of 914 persons (excluding the janitors) which compares this building pretty thickly. This shows an increase of about 100 over both Queen St. and the Central for the same month last year.

The increase in enrolment in the junior rooms, and in the kindergartens, over June last is: Miss Tuckberry's, 25; Miss McKellar's, 12; Miss Green's, 24; Miss Young's, 17; Miss Aylesworth's, 33-total, 111-which increase is without doubt due to the Board's action in resending the compulsory vaccination order.

World's Navies Burn Oil

THE New York Commercial Advertiser of Sept. 27, says that the British, French, German, Russian and Norwegian Navies are all experimenting with Fuel Oil on their battleships.

United States Secretary Moody has ordered work on the coaling stations in the Philippines and Hawaii discontinued until tests are concluded.

A Revolution in Oil Industry

Three large railway systems in England use fuel oil on locomotives instead of coal.

350 passenger steamers on the Caspian sea and Volga river are using petroleum oil exclusively as fuel.

Experts can calculate the extent of the coal deposits in length, breadth and thickness, but not of oil.-Brooklyn Citizen.

The steamer Pasadena, plying along the Pacific coast, has burned nothing but fuel oil since 1887. Now hundreds of Pacific steamers use fuel oil.

The Furness line is making experiments with fuel oil, which, if satisfactory, will result in the equipping of 125 steamers for burning fuel oil.

The steamer Mariposa, burning oil as a U. S. navy experiment, gained a whole day on her trip between San Francisco and Tahiti, and reduced her complement of men from 81 to 55 men.

Fuel oil on locomotives saves about 40 per cent per mile. 1250 pounds of oil will do the work of a ton of coal-2000 pounds-and then there are neither cinders, clinkers nor dirt, which add greatly to the comfort of the passengers.

In ocean steamers oil saves 27 per cent, as against the expense of coal. It takes 21 tons of coal to accomplish the work of 13 tons of oil. The saving in firemen is as one to five. The cost of fuel oil is about \$3 per ton.
