THREE KILLED BY EXPLOSION.

Water Tank Demolished and Scene of Carnage Deliuged

Schenectady, N. Y., July 2.—A tenton steel cylinder, loaded with brick of equal weight and filled with steam at a pressure of 120 pounds to the square inch, at the plant of the Schenectady, Sandstone Brick Co., was opened by mistake without first reducing the steam pressure, and as a result exploded.

The cylinder head, which was partly unsealed, went in one direction, killing two men, wrecking a portion of the plant, twisting a steel water tower into scrap iron, wrecking a big water tank and windmill, and deluging the scene of carnage with water.
