QUASH BY-LAW

The Judge Gives Harwich People Two Weeks to Defend Enactment

Motion at Osgoode Hall This Morning Complicates Matters in Kent Township

(Special to The Planet.)

Toronto, Ont., May 12. Mr. Justice Anglin to-day granted an order to quash the local option by-law, recently passed by the township of Harwich in the County of

The township did not oppose the notion, which was made by C. J. Holenan, K. C., on behalf of Wm. Walker.

There are 32 objections but the most serious are that after the by-law appointing deputy returning officers and polling places had been passed chang-es had been made to get cheaper places and men to act for nothing and thus save expenses.

No attempt was made to publish

the by-law in four conspicious places as required by law.

The township colicitor had advised that the by-law be not passed as it would be quashed easily and only would add to thew cost, but temperance people said they would provide for any costs incurred by passing the by-law.

The Judge ordered that the temper ance people receive a fortnight to come in and defend the by-law, otherwise the quashing order will issue. The motion was made by O. L. Lewis, counsel for the movers, in the action.

cult a Japanese landing at that point. Maj.-Gen. Pflug, telegraphing from Mukden under to-day's date, describes the reports that New Chwang has been evacuated and that the troops guarding the railroads are to be withdrawn and to be replaced by Chinese as being devoid of founda-

New York, May 12.-Through the posting by the general staff of a list containing 20 names of officers and men killed on board the torpedotransport Amur, April 25, a naval disaster not before reported, has just become public, says a World despatch from St. Petersburg.

According to the correspondent, the Amur, which was a sister ship of the ill-fated torpedo transport Yanesei, was laying mines in the Port Arthur
