WILL HAVE TO PAY UP

An Unpleasant Scandal in Local Intermediate Lacrosse Circles

A CASE FOR THE COURTS

An interesting case which will likely come up at the June sittings of the High Court is that of the 1905 Intermediate lacrosse executive vs. subscribers to the club's funds.

Quite a large number of those who signed their names to the subscription list refused to pay up on the grounds that last year's lacrosse team was not what it was represented it would be when the subscription list was circulated. This morning these gentlemen were served with writs, notifying them that the Intermediate lacrosse executive would sue them for the amounts for which they had signed. Some of Chatham's most prominent citizens are involved. These men state that they will fight the case, and the lawyer for the defense has already been secured.

One of the arguments which will be set forth by the defendants, is that when the subscription list was taken around, it was represented to the subscribers, that the lacrosse team would be a first class amateur aggregation, while it turned out to be a badly managed semi-professional association. They feel that the team was not by any means up to the mark. Some of the defendants claim that they were never canvassed for their subscriptions, and had thought no more of it until this morning when they received their notices of writs.

WERE IN DANGER

One Man Lost His Life In Fire At the Toronto Postoffice, Early Sunday Morning.

Toronto, April 30.—In a battle with smoke rather than flames, during which one life was lost and fifteen others placed in serious jeopardy, the Toronto fire department by sheer dogged determination and an almost heroic endurance early Sunday morning confined to the lower floors of the general postoffice a blaze which at one time threatened the entire building with destruction. The damage is estimated at from \$20,000 to \$30,000.

It is announced that there is but little loss of mail matter, and that postal business will be continued today as usual. There will be no delay in deliveries. The warehouse at Front and Lorne streets will be used as a temporary office.

Thomas Leary, night engineer of the building, and his dog, died probably from suffocation. Just how he met his fate will never be known.

That several other lives were not sacrificed also may perhaps be ascribed to a kindly providence.

The third and fourth floors of the postoffice building are occupied as the living apartments of George Ross, the assistant postmaster. He, his family of twelve, two lady visitors and a servant girl were sleeping. Two other sons were absent from home. When aroused, the smoke was filling the corridors so thickly that the impelled ones had to crawl along the floors. There was no time to don street apparel, and all were attired only in their night robes when, huddled together, they were rescued by the firemen. There were nine women, Mr. Ross and five of his sons taken out.
