Considerable comment is heard in these days with reference to the camp drill at Aldershot. This is a matter of public interest and certainly in order for free discussion. The Temperance rally at Berwick on Friday last seems to have been quite a successful affair in spite of the unpleasant weather and the fact that a number of the men advertised to speak were not present. Somewhere from 900 to 1000 people from all parts of the county are reported to have been present. Those who spoke were: Rev. J. W. Aiken, of Halifax; Prof. E. W. Sawyer, Rev. P. S. MacGregor, C. A. Campbell, M. L. A., A. E. Dunlop and F. S. Fisher. Good music was rendered by the Kingston band.

Rev. C. K. Morse, a graduate of Acadia in the class of '03 and for some time pastor of the Baptist church at Waterville, is evidently doing aggressive temperance work in the west. On his departure from Pilot, Man., recently for Brandon, while a farewell gathering was being held at the Baptist church, a number of anti-temperance people of the town congregated in front of the building and burned him in effigy. We congratulate Rev. Mr. Morse on the success which appears to be attending his efforts for temperance reform.

Liberal Opinion.

Montreal Witness.—We do not know who at the present time is backed by the most voting strength throughout the country, but certainly Mr. Borden has made something like a triumphal progress in his itinerary so far. Last night, at the Monument National, the atmosphere was so electrically confident that the battle must have seemed to many to be won—as an eloquent lawyer can persuade us to his side until we hear the other. But whatever the voting may tell us presently, Mr. Borden is certainly presenting an attractive program of reforms, a program that on some lines must appeal to Liberals as much as to Conservatives, if not more so. The next best thing to a good government is a strong opposing force with high ideals, and during the next few weeks Mr. Borden promises at least to supply a pressure that will make it easier for his opponents to do right and harder for them to do wrong.

September 'Canadian Pictorial.'

A Canadian pictorial at the end of a pier jutting out into one of the great lakes, her head silhouetted against the setting sun, which touches the dancing water with its slanting rays—this is the cover picture of the September Canadian Pictorial, the monthly which, though only in its second year, announces that there is a surprise in store next month, as it is to be enlarged considerably. In the series of distinguished Canadians, the public man chosen for this month is Sir Louis Jette, Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, and Lady Jette's picture appears in the woman's section. The important happenings of the month are illustrated: the explosion at Essex, Ont.; the fire at Old Orchard, in which half the summer hotels were destroyed and thousands of guests rendered temporarily homeless; the pilgrim Doukhobors in Winnipeg; the annual outing of the Canadian Alpine Club; the birthday of Professor Goldwin Smith. No Need of Prohibition Plank in Liberal-Conservative Platform.

The following letter which appeared in the Halifax Herald on Tuesday will be read with interest by many of the subscribers of THE ACADIAN, coming as it does from such an eminent authority on statistics as Dr. Johnson:

Sir.—In Saturday's Herald Edward Fulton thinks that Robert L. Borden missed a splendid opportunity when he neglected to insert an anti-drink plank in his political platform. Is there any need for such a plank in a liberal conservative platform?

If I read aright the statistics of the country, the liberal-conservative party always have been in favor of an anti-drink policy, while their opponents always have been in favor of drinking. The worst year this country ever had for drinking spirits was the first year the liberals came into power, (1874).

Take the eight years, 1897-1904, a liberal period, and the consumption of spirits, beer and wine in Canada was twenty-three per cent. greater than in the eight year period, 1889-1896—a conservative period.

I presume that it is results Mr. Fulton wants. The statistics supplied by the inland revenue department give the results and they prove that guggle and graft go together. When the grits are "in" the consumption of liquors increases. When the liberal-conservatives are in the consumption decreases.

With such a record, what need is there of the liberal-conservatives making a special platform for the temperance section of the voters? Needs speak louder than words.

In the past, prohibition has been bandied about by the political parties to such an extent that it is really refreshing to find one party making no special bid for that vote important as it is, but, instead, relying for commendation upon the fact that during a long series of years control of public affairs by that party (the liberal-conservative) has been accompanied by decreased consumption of liquors, while control by their opponents is accompanied by increase in such consumption.

If the temperance element in the county want a test, simple and easy of application, they will find it in the fact that after the grit party had been in power for eight years the quantity of spirituous liquors consumed increased one and two-third gallons per head of the population. Mind, PER HEAD.

Spirits travelled up as if a repressive force had been withdrawn as soon as the liberal-conservatives handed over the reins of their successors.

In 1898, for example, the spirits consumed per person—man, woman and child—in the Dominion, would represent 43 ounces. The next year by 53; the next by 56; the next by 61; the next year of the series by 70.

In the same way beer went up, or rather down, in yearly increasing quantities, beginning the series of years with a per head consumption of somewhat over 3 1/2 gallons, and ending with 4 1/2 gallons an increase of more than a gallon per head, so that in all the years of confederation there never was such a beer-guzzle year as 1904 excepting 1902—both of them grit years.

William Garvie once, in a moment of frankness, characterized the anti-confederate party as "the shout and shuffle party." Would he stamp the grit party to-day as "the graft and guggle party?"

A Notable Celebration.

From a copy of the Lewiston, Me. Evening Journal we learn of a very interesting ceremony which recently took place at Jefferson, in that State, commemorating the completion of a full century in the history of the town. One of the features in connection with the occasion, which was an inspiring one, was the erection of a monument to the early settlers. This monument is in the form of an immense boulder weighing thirty tons, taken from the shore of a pond nearly two miles distant from the selected site and requiring the strength of twenty oxen to move it to the spot selected for its erection.

Into the great rock an elegant bronze tablet has been set which bears the inscription: 'Dedicated to the first settlers of Jefferson, Maine.' Then follows the twelve names, one of whom, Samuel Jackson, was the great-grandfather of Mrs. F. W. Woodworth, of this town, who was present on the occasion. The movement in this undertaking commenced months ago and was the result of an agitation made by Dr. Fred W. Jackson, a wealthy resident of the town, also a lineal descendant of Samuel Jackson.

The rural militia of Nova Scotia went into camp at Aldershot on Monday for their annual twelve days' training. There will be about two thousand men under canvas. The force consists of six infantry regiments and one of cavalry, and in addition a composite Halifax regiment, made up of four companies from the 63rd and four from the 66th, will go down on Saturday night for four days. The other regiments in camp will be the 68th Kings, 60th Annapolis, 75th Lunenburg, 28th Colchester, Hants and Pictou, 93rd Cumberland, 94th Cape Breton, and the 14th K. O. M. Cadetive preparations have been made by the V. M. C. A. for this camp. The usual reading, and writing test and other features will be supplied. Meetings under charge of Evangelist Jos. McKay will be held, and Fred. Guilford, of Halifax, will have charge of the music.

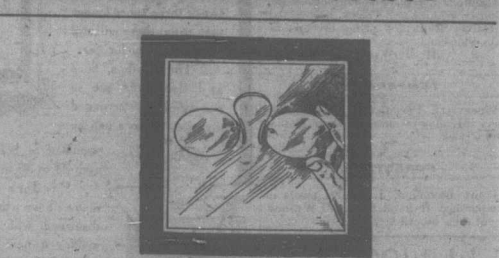
