A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may isomestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberts. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the discrict. Entiry by proof may be appeared by the discrimination of the first person and cultivation of the lend homesteader.

Duttes—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the lend in each of three years, bit homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or states.
