Two large schooners have just finished taking in cargoes of pulp wood at Harvey Bank, Graves & Foster shippers. Hon. Mr. Turner's shipyard will soon be lively again as "Boss" Dow and others are getting the moulds for the new vessel completed. The timber for keel and frame is about ready to come down the A. S. Railway from West River.

Harvey is progressing as rapidly as the weather will permit. The crop on the farm is better than it has been for several years.

ELGIN NOTES.—An occurrence of more than ordinary interest took place here in the mills of Com. E. A. Blakey on Saturday last. Hamilton McManus, who pretends to have a claim on these mills, arising out of a law suit with Joseph Blakey some two or three years ago, broke the lock on the great mill on Friday night, entered and took possession. During the night he put every thing out of the mills that he considered belonged to E. A. Blakey and on Saturday morning asserted his claim to what was not easily movable.

During Saturday, Blakey was advised by his lawyer to remove McManus either by law or otherwise. He, accordingly, in the evening, mustered his forces, between fifty and one hundred men, entered the mill and quietly laid him down outside. Since then Blakey has held possession. It is said that McManus cut a large bolt that cost over \$60 and destroyed other property belonging to Blakey. It is now supposed that further litigation will follow.

Rev. A. H. Lavers preached his farewell sermon here last Sunday evening. He has made many friends during the year he has been in charge of the Baptist churches in this Parish and his departure is universally regretted. He will reside at Sackville the last of this month and take up his abode near the educational institutions there. Falling illness compels him to abandon the pulpit for a season.

Rev. I. N. Parker has been away from the Parish on a much needed vacation for the past two or three weeks. In his efforts to build up the cause, dear to his heart, through the past year he got completely run down physically. Acting on the advice of the Quarterly Board at his last session he concluded to take a short respite from his labors. It is hoped that he will soon be able to return fully recuperated.

The superior school here opened in both departments on Monday Aug. 5th, the attendance is much larger than at the beginning of the summer term last year. Our teachers seem anxious to carry out the new Course of Instruction, issued by the Board of Education, even to its minutiae.

C. A. Burnham A. B. late of Media Penn., occupied the Baptist pulpit here morning and evening last Sabbath. Mr. Burnham is a pleasing, effective, and cultured speaker and his sermons were well received.

A full house greeted the colored Texas Jubilee Singers here on Saturday evening last and the voices in tune delighted their audience. Each piece was admirably rendered several of the solos being accord.

The farmers here have about finished haying. The hay crop proved a failure this year. Harvesting has been commenced by some of our farmers. John Gildart, whose barn was burned by lightning has erected another barn 40 x 40.

F. Wortman of Salisbury has employed here getting out pulp wood. Miss Florence McCullum of Peabody, Maine, who spent a few weeks here with her brother, has now gone to P. E. Island to visit friends before she returns to Maine.

Meaning Duffy of Hillsboro passed through Nixon last Friday. One of the head agents of a Montreal Fire Insurance Co., visited this place last Monday and carefully inspected the insured buildings. In many cases he reduced the amount of insurance, the dry season apparently frightening him.

ST. JOHN NOTES.—Not seeing many notes from our faculty by the sea in your paper perhaps a few lines would not be uninteresting to some of your readers. The city has settled down again after the Carnival and all are of the opinion that the Carnival was a success, and our visitors apparently enjoyed it. The exhibition association have decided not to hold an exhibition this fall but will do so in 1890. Opinions differ on this decision but your correspondent sees no reason why an exhibition should not be held. Simply because a small number of manufacturers cannot exhibit this fall, and who would not for the world want one hold without their being there. Moncton however is going to get there and that will afford a large number an opportunity of exhibiting.

As stated in the OBSERVER last week W. A. Lockhart has been elected Mayor of St. John over Hon. T. R. Jones. Very little interest centered in the election, people apparently caring little who got in. Only a little over one third a vote was polled, as has been generally the custom. Mr. Lockhart will, it is said, have a band on Kings Square probably twice a week during the summer months.

Among the familiar faces noticed by your correspondent this week from Albert Co. were Andrew Melane and T. W. Kinnie, of Albert. We have been having rather dull weather here since the Carnival, although not much rain, too much fog. I noticed a letter in the OBSERVER lately entitled "Albert Notes Criticized" which I think showed very little sense. As I read the Notes Criticized I think the letter was altogether uncalled for as the Notes were simply of a good natured style, damage to no one probably being intended and the sooner such as that better writer (whoever he is) is out of the country the better for all concerned.

The Bishop's Picnic is being held at Tenbyrns today and they are having a beautiful day. Thousands are in attendance. There are a large number of strangers in the City just now chiefly Americans of which the American boat brings a large proportion. The passenger lists of those boats have lately averaged somewhere between 250 and 300 passengers each trip.

Indianapolis presents a busy appearance around her wharves, in the afternoon especially. On Mondays and every alternate day as many as 5 steamers arrive there. On Monday, Aug. 12, the following arrived: "Clifton" from Hampton, "Belisle" from Belvidere, "Star" from Washedonok, "Acadia" from Fredericton, and "May Queen" from Grand Lake. The above is mentioned simply to give an idea of the traffic on the St. John and vicinity. On Tuesday and every alternate day three steamers I believe arrive. From the above you will observe the country is still alive and busting.

SHIPPING. IN THE UNITED KINGDOM there were 336 vessels of 929,611 tons gross under construction in the United Kingdom at the close of the quarter ended June 30. The total amount under construction at the same period last year was 377, of an aggregate of 1,098,118 tons. Among the vessels under construction 331 are steamers and 68 iron steamers. The increase in the shipbuilding trade has been of similar proportions at all the centres in the kingdom.

FINE SHIP CARPENTRY WORK.—Mr. Robert Murphy, formerly of Moncton but now a full fledged ship carver, completed a fine rigged ship on a small scale on which he has been working during occasional spare moments for the past seven or eight years. It is not an ordinary ship's model, but it is a fine long or three-masted and contains every part to be found in the largest ship afloat; including the timbers, planking, trellis, as well as every rope, block, sail, etc. It is a splendid specimen of the ship carver's art and is valued in the vicinity of \$800 or \$900.

A CLOUD BUST IN NOVA SCOTIA.—AMHERST, N. S., Aug. 8.—There was a cloud burst here at 3.30 p. m., which sprung to day, by a cloud-burst, which appeared in that vicinity, the like of which has never been experienced before. While the area was limited to a few miles, such portions of the country as were visited were deluged. Portions of the Interoceanic track were filled with water; the fields had the appearance of swifly flowing rivers, so great was the fall of water. Hay stacks were floated off, and considerable damage must have been caused to crops. The storm was soon over, but its work will be sadly felt.

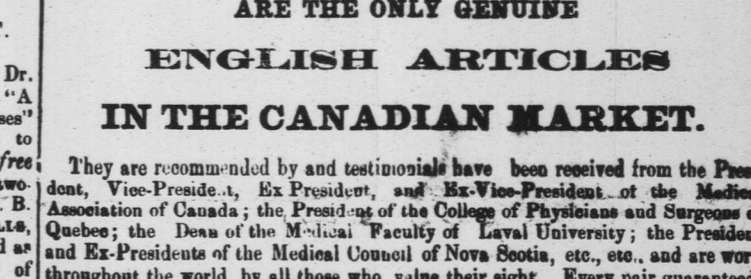
