THE RESIGNATIONS.

Our readers will doubtless have heard of the resignations, by the Hons. C. Young and Capt. Swabey, of their seats in the Executive Council, and also of their respective Government appointments. In making a few observations on this sudden change, we should desire to inform the public correctly of the reasons and points of issue between the parties, without resorting to low invectives or personality in the matter. If, therefore, we have been misinformed as to our premises, or are illogical in our conclusions, we shall be glad to be corrected.

At the formation of the present Government, it was allowed by their friends as well as opponents, that the Attorney General had neither had sufficient practice as an Attorney, nor did he possess competent ability as a Lawyer, satisfactorily to conduct that important office. It was also known, that Capt. Swabey was an unpopular man, holding High Church or ultra Tory notions, upon which he tried to graft the liboral ideas of the times. They were both supporters of Responsible Government, because they saw no other way to their obtaining either.
