LOCAL AND PROVINCIAL

Sunday School Training Class. The Interdenominational training school for Sunday School workers will be held in Mount Allison University, Sackville, Aug. 17-24 next.

More Money for Chatham Ferry. The Local Government has promised the M. S. N. Co. \$500 additional subsidy for their ferry boat, or \$1500 in all, and the ferry will run next season as usual.

Temperance Candidate Wins in Fredericton. By a vote of 498 to 415 Fredericton last week re-elected Mayor Mitchell for the third successive term and expressed approval of rigid enforcement of the Scott Act.

Potato Growers' Convention. In conjunction with the two week short course in Agriculture being held in Woodstock, March 20th to April 1, a New Brunswick Potato Growers' convention begins to-day at Woodstock and closes tomorrow night.

Campbellton Will Vote on License. At last week's meeting of the Campbellton town council a vote of the ratepayers was ordered taken on the third Tuesday of April in Wards I and III, as to whether or not liquor licenses should be issued in these wards.

Lumber Lands Deal Consummated. The purchasing of the grounds of the Prescott Lumber Co., of New Mills by Messrs. J. & A. Culligan has been completed. The price is understood to be in the vicinity of \$100,000. All movables are included in the purchase price. Mr. A. W. Barbour will fill the position of manager. It is reported, replacing Mr. Robert L. Myles who has resigned.—Campbellton Tribune.

636 Patients in Provincial Hospital. The patients in the Provincial Hospital last year numbered 357 men and 279 women—total 636. 172 new cases were admitted last year. 85 were discharged, and 61 died. The cost to the province was 41 cents per capita daily.

Hoarding Conditions in St. John. At the weekly luncheon of the St. John Rotary Club one day last week Commissioner F. L. Potts gave an address in which he dwelt upon the health and housing conditions of the city. St. John's greatest asset, he said, was the health of the people and in making careful investigation, he had found the conditions of housing far from satisfactory. The rents he said, in many parts of the city, were far above the pockets of the average working man, and in many cases two or three families would rent one flat, each family having one or two rooms. Their temperaments were different, and this sort of thing was not productive of good health. The children were not given a chance and disease soon made inroads. Consumption was very prevalent, although people had not been alive to the fact. The opening of the new hospital had in a great measure opened the eyes of the public to this, and steps should be taken to combat the awful havoc the disease was working. Continuing, the Commissioner said that he was very glad to find that in speaking to people, they were anxious to add their support to the operation of the housing bill. A moderate tax on all land would add greatly to the revenue of the city, and would tend to moderate the price of houses. The land could be used to much more advantage and people would be encouraged to buy their own houses, instead of paying rent all their lives.

New Facts on Prohibition

St. John Pastor Answers Anti-Prohibition Advertisements that Appear in Certain Newspapers

Noting with great pleasure that the Telegraph and Times of St. John had refused anti-prohibition advertisements and that the Standard had discontinued them, in spite of the great financial loss thereby, Rev. R. J. Haughton of the St. John Congregational church, recently answered some of the assertions made in the advertisements.

West Virginia. "We are told by the liquor men that prohibition is a failure in West Virginia. But here is what Governor Hatfield says: 'Men who opposed the law are now in its favor, and thousands of families have been made happier, and grocery bills, rentals and other necessary items are being promptly paid by hundreds of men who formerly drank and gambled and their earnings while wives and children were left without subsistence.' Shall we believe the Personal Liberty League, which is the liquor dealers' league, or shall we believe the governor of West Virginia?"

Kansas. "Kansas, too, is pointed out as another place where prohibition is a failure. The Liberty League is sending broadcast notoriously false statements concerning the failure of prohibition in Kansas. But Governor Capper, in a recent public statement, says: 'The success of prohibition in Kansas has been so complete and conspicuous that the organized liquor interests of the country seem to feel it absolutely necessary to belittle the reputation of that state. In attempting to do this they use false figures and they misuse true figures to produce false impressions.' Governor Capper further says that the enforcement of the prohibitory law distinctly promotes social welfare, and reduces to a minimum economic waste consequent upon the liquor traffic and allied evils. He also says, 'The saloon keeper and his comrades have been excluded from effective participation in the politics of the state.'

In Kansas City. "In the year 1906 Kansas City, Kansas, had a population of 90,000 when Attorney-General Coleman decided that its liquor shops must be cleaned up. Almost the whole city resisted the attempt. A delegation of bankers, lawyers, merchants, real estate dealers, manufacturers and politicians went to the city and argued with him—begged and threatened him. They told him that he would drive business away and ruin the city, and make sure defeat for his party at the next election. Mr. Coleman told them that he was sorry, but he had sworn to enforce the law and he meant to do so. Kansas City in June 1906, had then more than 200 open saloons. In thirty days there was not a saloon in the whole city, and there have been none ever since. Within the first year of prohibition in Kansas, grocers and dry goods merchants declared that their business had improved. Shoe dealers, lumber merchants and furniture dealers had the same story of increased business to tell. Bank deposits increased within the first year by more than a million and a half of dollars.

Last year in Kansas, in eleven counties, the jails were empty. Thirty-two of the one hundred and five counties had no inmates in their county farms, or poorhouses, and the land had been rented to farmers. Last year the deposits in state and national banks in Kansas totalled over \$204,000,000, and the tax payers spent on automobiles \$30,000,000.

"An eminent authority has recently said: 'My investigation has convinced me that it would be as easy to topple Gibraltar into the sea, as to overthrow prohibition in Kansas.' 'Sometime ago a rumor was started—not based on facts—that the vigorous enforcement of law in Kansas was to be relaxed, and a delegation of prominent men, most of them the same men who had tried to stop the closing crusade, rushed to the office of the attorney-general and said: 'For God's sake don't let that rotten order of things return to Kansas City. The town was never so prosperous as now, and we want to keep it so.'

"Do the people of St. John and of the province of New Brunswick desire any further proof of the fact that prohibition is a complete and conspicuous success in Kansas? In State of Arizona

"The liquor dealers know that it is not true when they say that prohibition breeds criminals and increases taxes. In the state of Arizona prohibition has worked marvels for human betterment and social improvement.

"The decrease in drunkenness in Arizona is an unanswerable argument that prohibition can be made to prohibit. Prohibition went into operation in Arizona, January 1, 1915. For that year there was a decrease of arrests for drunkenness of 2,890, or 85 per cent.

"For the city of Phoenix there was a remarkable showing. There was an increase of over \$5,000,000 in taxable wealth, a decrease in the tax rate, and about \$20,000 less in cost to the city government for six months of 1915, as compared with the first half
