

April, at the Tavistock dairy school, and remained there assisting Mr. Bell till the first part of June, then the work of inspection began. Mr. Bell received applications from fifty-one factories. I visited fifty of these and Mr. Bell the other one, as I could not get to it as soon as they wanted me.

In the course of my duties I travelled 4.000 by train and drove 825 miles. I tested 3,953 samples of milk with the Quevenne Lactometer, and 1,130 samples with one-eighth of an inch, or less of acid. with Dr. Babcock's milk test, making a total of 5.083 tests.

The poorest sample of milk that I received for inspection tested four-fifths of one per cent butterfat, and the best sample tested 5.20 per cent butterfat. During the months of May, June, July and Auand keep it for testing the ones in use. gust, samples taken from the vats tested from 3.40 to 3.80 per cent butterfat. Then in the months of September, October and November, samples taken from the vats

tested from 3.80 to 4.20 per cent butterfat. I went to the farms of ten patrons to get samples of milk as drawn from the cows. With regard to knives and mills, there are a number of these in use that are quite opposition. unfit to work with. Quite often you will find a curd knife with half of the blades loose and some of them missing altogether; with a knife of this description curd cannot be cut properly. Now I do not blame the managers for this. Every cheesemaker should take interest enough in his work to see that his knives are in proper

condition to do first class work. I think that I have used every kind of curd mills during the past season, from the old peg mill of twenty years ago up to the latest tear and grind it all to pieces.

Some of the makers pay very little atcheese all shapes and sizes; they have been pressed too quickly, and not turned in the hoops in the morning. The result is anything but satisfactory-crooked cheese with projecting shoulders. When

HOUSECLEANING HINTS.

A Number of Useful and Timely Suggestions to be Remembered

Dip spots of mildew in buttermilk and place in the sunshine.

Place dishes of charcoal or quick lime in sink cupboards or other damp corners. Beware of cheap soap and soap powders in cleaning woodwork, unless you are going to repaint.

Never relay a carpet until the floor is perfectly dry, or the tacks will rust and njure the carpet.

Zinc is best cleaned with sapolio and hot water, and then polished with kerosene and a woolen cloth.

Carpets in daily use should have the breadths ripped apart and reversed, to bring the most wear to different parts.

Raw linseed oil is much better than kerosene for oiling furniture, but it must be rubbed thoroughly dry with a woolen

If you take down any stoves, remove the nickle trimmings, scour and wrap each piece separately in paper and lay in dry place.

Clean straw mattings and rattan furniture with salt and water, changing the water often. Washed in this way they will not turn yellow.

The durability and brightness of oilcloth are increased by a coat of varnish If a fruit farming region is wanted there semi-annually, or by rubbing over with kerosene once a month.

> Do not wash and put away blankets until June, and when you do use borax and plenty of hot water and they will clean easily and look well.





If there is no wire close foul air in a cellar will permeate through the entire house and endanger the health of the inmates. Never put down stair carpet without pads underneath. They wear much longer, and are much easier to use. An old "tack" or heavy bed-quilt, cut in proper-sized pieces, answer the purpose. Windows are easier cleaned and have a far higher polish if a little alcohol or ammonia is added to the water and no soap used. After rubbing dry with a cloth, polish with chamois or pieces of news-All mattresses and pillows should have covers of unbleached muslins, and tied or buttoned at the end, to protect the ticks. These do not require washing oftener than every six months, and are a real Wall paper may be cleaned and made to look much fresher by rubbing with soft cloths dipped in oatmeal, if the cloths are changed often and never used when dusty. 


