**PROF. DYDE CHOSEN FOR NEW COLLEGE**

The Senate and Board of Management of the new institution unanimously adopted the recommendation of the committee.

Without a dissenting voice and with great enthusiasm the joint meeting of the session and board of management of the new Presbyterian College of Alberta, held Tuesday in First Presbyterian church, accepted the nomination of the sub-committee for the new college.

The choice has fallen upon Prof. Dyde, of Queen's university, Kingston, Ont., one of the intellectual giants of the denomination and a leader in Presbyterianism in Canada. Prof. Dyde has accepted the offer and his appointment will date from the last of May, 1911. For some time he has been desirous of coming to the west as he sees here a great field for his work.

Samuel Walters Dyde, M.A., D.Sc., LL.D., is professor of mental philosophy in Queen's university, Kingston, Ont. He holds the position of 1889 up to the present time. He was previously a professor in the University of New Brunswick and was educated at Ottawa, Collège, Queen's university, and in Germany. He was born at Ottawa in 1862. As an author he is widely known by his magazine articles, sermons, and philosophical treatises. He is a specialist in philosophy. He has a sound comprehensive knowledge of English literature.

He is an all-round scholar, a good administrator and a man of forceful personality.

Prof. Dyde has taken a prominent part in the discussion of the severance of Queen's university from church control as an antagonist to separatism. In the last three or four years he has been an outstanding figure in the general assembly of the Presbyterian church through the part he has taken in the debate of this question and on the question of church union.
